- Brian Casey earns $€ 1,900$ net per month and expects to receive a tax refund of $€ 800$ net in February.
- Deirdre Casey earns $€ 1,750$ net per month and expects to receive an increase of $€ 400$ net per month from $1^{\text {st }}$ March.
- Child benefit is $€ 550$ net per month.
- The family expects to receive a dividend on shares of $€ 1,200$ net in February.

## Expenditure

- House Rental is $€ 550$ per month but will increase to $€ 650$ per month from $1^{\text {st }}$ February.
- House Contents insurance premium, $€ 600$ per year, is payable monthly from $1^{\text {st }}$ January.
- The annual insurance on the family car is $€ 550$, payable in March.
- Household expenses are usually $€ 2,100$ per month except in February, when they are $€ 1,000$ less.
- ESB bills for light and heat are expected to amount to $€ 250$ in January and $€ 300$ in March, while a fill of heating oil, costing $€ 600$, will be needed in February.
- Car running costs will be $€ 400$ per month except in April when a car service will cost an extra $€ 300$.
- The Casey family pay a monthly subscription of $€ 30$ to their telephone company for the use of the Internet (World Wide Web). As well as that, the ordinary telephone bill for the home is expected to be $€ 150$ in February and $€ 200$ in April.
- The family have booked a holiday costing $€ 2,500$ during the school break in February.
- Entertainment will cost $€ 800$ each month except in February, when it will cost $€ 300$.

Mike O'Shea is the purchasing manager at DIY Hardware Ltd. On 22 March 2004, he received the following quotation:


Mike decides that the Sturdy Tool Boxes are too costly. He sends an Order (No. 4923) to Kerry Hardware Supplies Ltd for $\mathbf{5 0}$ Decko Hammer Drills, 200 Aluminium Step Ladders and 400 Phillips Screwdriver Sets.

These goods are delivered in a truck to DIY Hardware Ltd on 29 March 2004. After Mike signs the delivery note, he is handed Invoice No. 1623, dated 29 March 2004, by the truck driver.
