The vision of the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) is not only to end poverty in developing countries but in places like Ireland too. The Millennium Development Goals (MDGs) were about tackling poverty, hunger and inequality, but did not address the root causes of those issues. The SDGs aim to look at causes of poverty and address what blocks development.

Each day, 795 million people in the world go hungry.

That means we live in a world where one in nine people go to bed hungry every night. More than 90 million children under the age of five are still undernourished and underweight

Sustainable Development Goal 2 (SDG 2) aims to end hunger and ensure that everyone can get enough good nutritious food all year round by 2030.

We want to see a world where no one dies for want of safe, good, nutritious food. That is why we tackle hunger to change people's lives.

Ending hunger by 2030 is possible with political will and support. If everyone takes on their share of responsibility we can make sure that every person everywhere has access to sufficient nutritious food all year round.

The census

gathers lots of details about everybody who is in the country on census night. In the most recent census in April 2016 everybody in Ireland had to enter their details on a census form.

The importance of the census is that it covers everybody in the country no matter where they are. The results provide very important information on not only population size for the country as a whole, but also about the make-up of the population of towns, villages and other small areas across the country.

A census provides the information that is needed to plan for the provision of housing, education, healthcare, infrastructure, etc.

As well as collecting information on the age and sex of the population, a range of different questions about households and individuals are also asked. These include where and what people work at, how people travel to work, school and college, languages spoken, disabilities, families, housing and lots more.

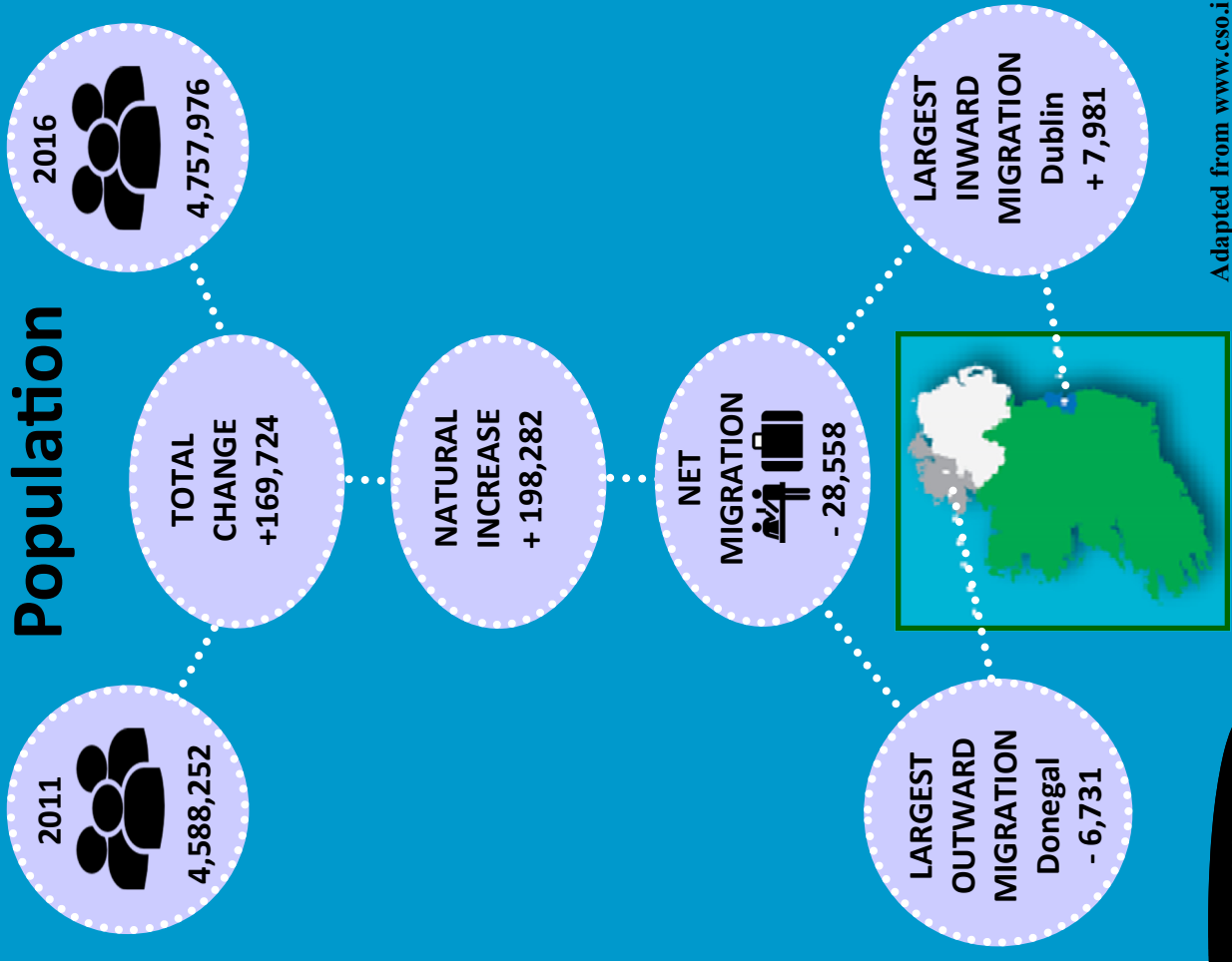

When farmers and workers can sell on Fairtrade terms, it gives them a better deal: a chance to improve their lives and plan for their future.

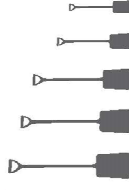
Fairtrade gives the shopper a powerful way to reduce poverty through our everyday shopping.
