## Dublin Zoo

1. Dublin Zoo was opened in 1830; up to this the Irish people had never seen such fascinating animals. During the early years London Zoo donated the animals to Dublin Zoo. People rushed to catch a glimpse of wild and wonderful creatures they had only heard about but never seen. The Zoo became a popular family destination in Ireland; in fact one day in 1838 the Zoo welcomed 20,000 visitors - an attendance record that still stands to this day. Leo Oosterweghel is the director of the zoo and he oversees the day to day running of the Zoo. He believes that the role of the Zoo is to help to secure the future of some of the world's endangered animals.
2. The Zoo is home to many different types of animals. To name but a few, there are tigers, hippos, bats, lions, rare monkeys, gorillas, orangutans, chimpanzees and red pandas. Some of these animals are on the world's endangered species list. The Zoo received its first giraffe in 1844 and its first pair of lions in 1855. The people that care for the animals in the Zoo are called Zoo Keepers; there are about 35 Zoo Keepers in Dublin Zoo. They have to work very hard and they do more than just cuddle the animals! A zoo keeper provides daily care for the animals. This includes cleaning houses, preparing feeds, providing water and bedding etc. Keepers also have to keep daily records of the animals' health, diet and behaviour.
3. Dublin Zoo has a year-round education calendar. The programmes offered at the Zoo aim to encourage children to appreciate their surroundings and develop a greater respect for nature - children are shown how to handle and care for the animals in these programmes! Teachers can bring their students to the Zoo to learn many interesting facts that cannot be learned in a classroom.
4. The Zoo opens all year round (except for Christmas Day and St Stephen's Day) but most people visit during the months of May, June, July, August and September. Dublin Zoo runs a very special scheme which allows people to adopt an animal of their choice; you can visit your adopted animals and see them grow in the Zoo. All money raised from adoptions goes directly to the upkeep of these animals. Many people adopt an animal as a gift for a family member or friend.

Read this piece adapted from The Adventures of Tom Sawyer, by Mark Twain; then answer the questions that follow.

Tom is a young boy who lives with his Aunt. He hates school and loves adventures. He decides to run away with his two friends Joe and Huck. They decide to hide on an island nearby.

1. By the time the bell rang for the beginning of school that morning, Tom was far away. He had decided that nobody loved him, nobody would miss him, and they would all be sorry when they found out what they had made him do. Tom and Joe decided to go to Jackson's Island, which was a few miles down the river. They would live there and pretend to be pirates. They searched for Huckleberry Finn and he agreed to go with them. They arranged to meet at midnight, two miles from the village, at a lonely spot on the river bank.
2. At midnight Tom arrived at the meeting place. He brought a boiled ham with him. Joe had brought a side of bacon and was tired after carrying it there. Huck had a saucepan and some corn. Tom said it would be no good starting out without some fire. That was a wise thought for matches were hardly known those days. They saw a fire on a large boat close to the bank, and went quickly to help themselves to a piece of it. Luckily all the men from the boat were in the village. At last they pushed the raft into the water and started on their great adventure. It took them nearly an hour to reach the island. They unloaded their food and made a tent out of an old sail to keep the raft sheltered. They would sleep in the open as all good pirates do.
3. Tom was first to wake next morning. For a minute he could not think where he was. Then he remembered. Joe and Huck were still asleep, but it did not take long to wake them. They ran to the river and found that the raft had floated away during the night. After breakfast they set off to see the island. They spent the day swimming and catching fish. Joe and Huck fell asleep so Tom decided to swim the three miles to a small boat attached to the ferry and travel across the river to see what was going on in the village. Hiding behind a bush near his home he heard Aunt Polly crying. The raft had been found at noon six miles from the village. The search was to continue.
