In this passage celebrities talk about their favourite outdoor places. Read the passage and then answer the questions that follow.

## Favourite Places

1. There's always something special about being outside, enjoying nature. Being in the garden or walking through the local park can calm a busy mind. Here, some busy people talk about the places they go to escape from the stress of everyday life.
2. Michelle O'Doherty's life has been very busy lately but she has loved her time working on TV3's programme Exposé. During her months in Dublin, she enjoyed winding down from a busy day in the TV3 studio with a wander along her favourite beaches - Sandymount or Dollymount. "I go there and walk for hours. The water calms me. I think it's the noise of the ocean and the lovely sea breeze," she says.
3. Although she's still only 18 , Joanne O'Riordan has given a speech at the United Nations, met with the President and written her own weekly newspaper article. "I rarely get much time to myself but when I do manage it, I try to grab a nice moment of peace in the corner of the garden. It's full of flowers and very colourful, and there's a little seating area that my brother built. I usually go there during the summer when the weather is fine, or on a nice mild day. It's lovely to chill out there - but if it's wet or cold, then, like other teenagers, I retreat to my bedroom, put on my headphones and it's a case of - world off and switch off."
4. Winning Streak presenter Sinead Kennedy spends much of her life travelling between Cork and Dublin, but when she gets a spare moment, she likes to spend it by the sea - preferably on a surfboard. "I love surfing but I'd like to be better at it. However, I don't have enough time to practise and get really good. You need to surf two or three times a week to become anyway good at it, but I only get to surf once in a blue moon. When I'm by the sea though, I feel my worries slipping away - especially when I'm surfing because I'm trying so hard to keep my balance that I've no time to think about anything else!"
