Read this passage about Brian Toomey's recovery from a horse-riding accident and then answer the questions.

## BRIAN TOOMEY'S STORY



1. Under Brian Toomey's mop of curly brown hair is a long scar. He parts his hair to show the scar he got from a fall from his horse in 2013. The scar was caused when doctors had to remove part of his skull. The fall was so bad that doctors gave him a three per cent chance of survival. In total he spent 157 days in hospital. Yet here he is now, fit and well and making jokes. He has also won back his jockey's licence.
2. Just two years after his accident, he passed all the medical tests to once again become a professional jockey. Solway Dandy, the horse from which he fell was fine. Toomey says he feels no fear now as he practises with his new horse, galloping along the beach as if nothing had happened. King's Grey his spectacular new eleven year old horse is taken for a paddle in the sea as the salt water is good for horses' legs. Brian is cool and confident as the horse bounces with excitement because it's the first time the horse has ever seen the sea. Doesn't Brian worry that he's taking too much of a risk? He has fallen six or seven times in training since recovering from the accident.
3. When he got out of hospital he became good at pretending he felt better than he did. "I was keeping everything to myself. I didn't want to let my friends and family know how badly it was affecting me. I didn't like to talk about it so it was harder than I let on. I became more determined and I'm going to try harder than before... I feel lucky."
4. "People ask me why I want to go back doing horse racing. I tell them it's my passion. I'm not interested in anything else." To him, racing is his life.
What do his parents think about it? "They're happy but only because I am happy," he says. "Of course they'll be worried; they're only human. They know horse racing is all I ever wanted and never for a second did they try to put me off."
5. He is a bit nervous about the race on Sunday which will be his first professional race since the accident. He knows all eyes will be on him. "It's a small race but it's the biggest race I'll have ever run."
