READING

Read carefully the following essay (in adapted form) by Kate Thompson and then answer the questions that follow.

Holidays

I have always hankered after luxury and I'm convinced that it is because, as a child, my parents used to take us on camping holidays. Not the kind of camping holidays that are commonplace today, you understand – the kind of holidays where you pitch your tent on a site with 'facilities' such as showers and laundries and restaurants and shops. Oh, no! Our tents were ex-army, as were our camp beds. OUR camping holidays would have made the *Royal Marines* look like *My Little Pony Camp*! Comfort was not a criterion in our accommodation arrangements.

Catering arrangements were equally unsophisticated. My mother heated up tins of dubious stew over a Primus stove and gathered water from rivers. Like a latter day Amazonian she hacked branches for firewood and foraged for edible mushrooms and berries in the local woodland. Luck rather than any detailed knowledge of nature's bounty was probably all that stood between us and a severe dose of food poisoning. Mother loved these family adventures and would frequently recall them in vivid detail many years later.

My father despised namby-pambyism. He was an early advocate of self-sufficiency and environmental awareness. His sense of humour occasionally baffled us. When he sent me and my brother off in the rain to chase after lambs up Mount Errigal, instructing us to bring one home for dinner, we didn't realise he was joking. We really feared for those lambs. Perhaps it was these childhood experiences that later led my brother to adopt a vegetarian diet.

Each time we went away on one of our so-called 'holidays', one of my chores was to go to the local farm with a jerry can for milk. So was it any wonder, as I grew up and all my friends started going on exotic holidays to places like Tenerife, that I fantasised about talcum-powder beaches and palm trees and sun loungers? Later when my husband and I were struggling actors, *any* holiday was a rare luxury. Ironic, because when you are between acting jobs you have all the time in the world to take off on holiday, but never enough money to go anywhere exotic.

We did get to head to the West of Ireland a lot – my mother-in-law had a mobile home in a glorious situation overlooking Clew Bay – but that never seemed like a *proper* holiday. We still had to cook

and clean and keep an eye on our daughter Clara and the hordes of friends who would join her – and back then mobile homes were hardly the last word in luxury. It has been there for thirty years now and has what might be euphemistically described as a 'lived-in' look. While beauty-board, swirly acrylic carpets and Crimplene curtains may have been the last word in caravan furnishings back in the seventies, I understand that mobile homes these days come with Jacuzzis, teak decking and state-of – the-art entertainment systems for your amusement in the event of rain. We had jigsaws, a couple of decks of cards and Cluedo – with Mrs White and the lead piping missing.

My father might have applauded our austerity. I still hankered after luxury.
