# FRENCH Junior Certificate 2004 Marking Scheme

In reading this marking scheme, the following points should be noted:

A **forward slash** / before an answer indicates that the answer is synonymous to that which preceded it or is an alternative answer. Answers separated by a forward slash cannot therefore be taken as different answers.

A dash - before an answer indicates that the answer is a separate answer, which may be considered as independent of any other suggested answers to the question.

**Square brackets** [ ] indicate material relating to the marking scheme which is additional information for the benefit of examiners.

**Round brackets** ( ) indicate material which may be given in the answer but is not considered to be essential in order for the candidate to gain full marks.

**N. B.** The answers given on the marking scheme should not be considered as the only possible answers that may be accepted. Answers which are synonymous with or equivalent to those on the published marking scheme are also acceptable.

A **penalty system** involving the deduction of marks applies in order to prevent the possibility of candidates "listing" all the possible answers to a particular question. In such cases a correct answer may be cancelled out by an additional incorrect answer.

#### Reasonable Accommodation in Certificate Examinations.

In the case of candidates aided by a scribe or tape-recorder, it may not always be possible to evaluate fully <u>spelling</u> and certain elements of <u>grammar</u>. In such cases the totality (i.e. 100 %) of marks available for language expression in the written production section (section III) is to be allocated to the elements of language that can be tested.

Candidates granted a waiver re assessment of spelling / grammar will have the language marks calculated on *vocabulary*, *idiom and register* only. In marking such scripts, errors in grammar and in spelling will be ignored in determining a mark to be awarded

In French TSAL, this modification is relevant to the two questions in Section III of the paper where there are 15 marks available for language in question (a) and 25 marks for language in question (b) and to parts of Section I where the French spelling of certain words such as "juin" will be accepted in the case of RACE scripts only.

#### SECTION III (Written Expression) (80 marks)

#### (a) The Postcard

The candidate must deal with <u>three points</u>. Each point should be credited as soon as it is encountered in the answer by writing P1, P2, P3 <u>in the left-hand margin</u>. The mark awarded under both headings - communication and language - is then determined by reference to the marking grid on page 13.

( Note modifications to the assessment of language in the case of R.A.C.E. scripts as already stated on page 1 of this marking scheme.)

#### (b) Letter:

Format = 5 marks Communication = 20 marks Language = 25 marks

Total = 50 marks

Format: The five marks for letter format are determined as follows:

- ♦ *Place* (in Ireland) and *date* must be on the same line towards the top right-hand corner
- ♦ Month must not begin with capital letter. A date in September must be given.
- ♦ Year is optional

e.g. "Wexford, le 25 septembre" is fully correct.

- ◆ <u>Greeting</u>: Accept "Chère Marie Claire" or "Salut (Marie Claire)" or "Bonjour (Marie Claire)"
- ♦ <u>Signing off</u>: Any of the normally accepted formulae will suffice e.g. "amitiés" "amicalement", "A bientôt", "salut" etc. but spelling must be fully correct.

#### **Marking** of Format:

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place / address = 1
le + figure = 1
[ the figure may be written out as a word but spelling must be correct e.g. "le quinze septembre" or "le 15 septembre"]
month = 1
chère, etc = 1
signing off = 1
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#### **Communication:**

There are five points to dealt with in the letter. As each point is encountered, it should be marked P1, P2, etc in the <u>left-hand margin.</u>

N.B. In both the letter and the postcard, a point must be disallowed <u>only</u> where there is *no reference at all* to the point or where any reference made is *totally incomprehensible*.

The quality and adequacy of communication in the letter should be judged in accordance with the marking grid on page 13.

#### Language:

Evaluate the use of vocabulary, spelling, verb tenses, pronouns, prepositions, agreement of adjectives, use of negatives etc in accordance with the marking grid on page 12

( Note modifications to the assessment of language in the case of R.A.C.E. scripts as already stated on page 1 of this marking scheme.)
