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

David Quirke was about seven or eight when he first saw *Willy Wonka and the Chocolate Factory*. "That film really touched an emotional chord within me about the power of the imagination."

Even at that age he was impressed with the clever marketing behind the priceless golden tickets in the Wonka bar that had everyone falling over themselves to buy the chocolate product. "Not only did I want to be Willy Wonka but I also loved the marketing idea behind it, the brand."

Quirke, 32, now specialises in the business of ideas. He is partner with Norman Hewson (yes, Bono's brother) in the extremely popular Nude restaurant in Suffolk Street, Dublin, that sells fast food of the healthy variety. The trendy eaterie offers attractive vegetarian and organic food choices, and uses local suppliers. It uses recycled material and glass bottles.

He is also closely involved in the running of Skooter, now the main Irish distributor for the stylish Italian Piaggio scooters (he gets around town on a Piaggio 180cc).

His latest venture is E-taxis – whereby customers needing a taxi will be able to text message E-taxi, which will then locate the nearest available taxi and trigger a call between the driver's phone and that of the customer.

Although Quirke had no formal business education, he knew he had a talent for marketing. "I couldn't write a business plan but I knew I had enthusiasm and a passion for ideas."

Throughout our interview, Quirke is constantly, almost exhaustingly optimistic about how much simpler and happier his "new way" of doing business will be. "I really enjoy doing what I do and I have a good laugh and I love it, because it's not hard."





# "Drink still the demon," says public



Most Irish people believe that alcohol is a major cause of violence in Ireland today and that it often plays a large part in marital breakdown. They also believe that drink is too readily available to young people and that promotions such as happy hours and cut-price offers lead to excessive drinking.

Three-quarters of those interviewed believe the number of outlets selling drink to take away should be strictly limited and controlled. All but five percent of people believe that we have more than enough supermarkets and off-licences selling alcohol to take away.



This was around the time I made my Communion, and everyone's ma seemed to dress the same – big roomy, shapeless, grey, calf-length overcoat, headscarf, flat shoes and a leatherette shopping bag. Some of these women were young, but they too dressed in the uniform, as if Crumlin was an outpost of Stalinist Russia. When our new neighbours Vera and Sean moved in, it was like the Iron Curtain had parted. Vera was a Doris Day\* look-alike and Sean was tall and handsome. And Vera didn't wear the regulation issue.

But it was when Olive White started to appear on the telly that the Swingin' Sixties came to Crumlin. Big time.

Olive was beautiful, in fact she was crowned Miss Ireland. In fact, she was fourth in the Miss World Contest. So there. Better still she got a job in Radio Telefís Éireann, working with Gay Byrne on *Jackpot*. Every time she appeared on the screen, I'd recite 'That's Olive White – her sister is best friends with my brother's girlfriend'.

And then Olive went away and married Daphne du Maurier's son. I hadn't a clue who Daphne du Maurier was, but I knew, from the way my brother's girlfriend said it, that she was rich, glamorous and famous, like Grace Kelly\* who was all these things.

Olive came home to visit her ma, driving this trendy little Austin Mini, wearing knee-length, white boots and a fitted coat that flared out above her knees, and, you know, the world was never the same again.

Now, all of this had a deep effect on us. If God had been good enough to single out Clogher Road, Crumlin, as a special place, then my brother was ready to answer the call. With the savings from his summer job, he bought drainpipe trousers and a shiny jacket with a velvet collar. What with Doris Day as a neighbour, Olive White a celebrity, and my brother a teddy boy, my head was in a spin.
