## **Note to teachers and students on the use of published marking schemes**

Marking schemes published by the State Examinations Commission are not intended to be standalone documents. They are an essential resource for examiners who receive training in the correct interpretation and application of the scheme. This training involves, among other things, marking samples of student work and discussing the marks awarded, so as to clarify the correct application of the scheme. The work of examiners is subsequently monitored by Advising Examiners to ensure consistent and accurate application of the marking scheme. This process is overseen by the Chief Examiner, usually assisted by a Chief Advising Examiner. The Chief Examiner is the final authority regarding whether or not the marking scheme has been correctly applied to any piece of candidate work.

Marking schemes are working documents. While a draft marking scheme is prepared in advance of the examination, the scheme is not finalised until examiners have applied it to candidates' work and the feedback from all examiners has been collated and considered in light of the full range of responses of candidates, the overall level of difficulty of the examination and the need to maintain consistency in standards from year to year. This published document contains the finalised scheme, as it was applied to all candidates' work.

In the case of marking schemes that include model solutions or answers, it should be noted that these are not intended to be exhaustive. Variations and alternatives may also be acceptable. Examiners must consider all answers on their merits, and will have consulted with their Advising Examiners when in doubt.

## **Future Marking Schemes**

Assumptions about future marking schemes on the basis of past schemes should be avoided. While the underlying assessment principles remain the same, the details of the marking of a particular type of question may change in the context of the contribution of that question to the overall examination in a given year. The Chief Examiner in any given year has the responsibility to determine how best to ensure the fair and accurate assessment of candidates' work and to ensure consistency in the standard of the assessment from year to year. Accordingly, aspects of the structure, detail and application of the marking scheme for a particular examination are subject to change from one year to the next without notice.

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## Structure of the marking scheme

Candidate responses are marked according to different scales, depending on the types of response anticipated. Scales labelled A divide candidate responses into two categories (correct and incorrect). Scales labelled B divide responses into three categories (correct, partially correct, and incorrect), and so on. The scales and the marks that they generate are summarised in this table:

A general descriptor of each point on each scale is given below. More specific directions in relation to interpreting the scales in the context of each question are given in the scheme, where necessary.

### Marking scales – level descriptors

#### A-scales (two categories)

- incorrect response (no credit)
- correct response (full credit)

#### B-scales (three categories)

- response of no substantial merit (no credit)
- partially correct response (partial credit)
- correct response (full credit)

#### C-scales (four categories)

- response of no substantial merit (no credit)
- response with some merit (low partial credit)
- almost correct response (high partial credit)
- correct response (full credit)

#### D-scales (five categories)

- response of no substantial merit (no credit)
- response with some merit (low partial credit)
- response about half-right (middle partial credit)
- almost correct response (high partial credit)
- correct response (full credit)

In certain cases, typically involving incorrect rounding, omission of units, or a misreading that does not oversimplify the work, a mark that is one mark below the full-credit mark may be awarded. Such cases are flagged with an asterisk. Thus, for example, Scale 10C\* indicates that 9 marks may be awarded. The \* is not applied for a missing euro symbol, unless otherwise specified.

## Solutions and detailed marking notes

### QUESTION 1

(a)

Scale 5B\*

(0, 3, 5)

Find 13.5% of €168.

$$€168 \times \frac{13.5}{100} = €22.68$$

\*\* Accept correct answer with no work.

\*\* Accept answer in cent form, but must indicate this.

\* Failure to round or incorrect rounding.

#### Partial Credit

- Evaluates 113.5% (€190.68)
- Calculates 86.5% (€145.32)
- Inverts 13.5% (€1244.44)
- Inverts €168 (€0.000803)
- Misplaced decimal.
- Answer = 13.5±168. (€181.5/€154.5)
- Any use of 100

(b)

Scale 5B

(0, 3, 5)

In a season, Jim scores 9 tries and 24 penalties.  
A try is worth 5 points and a penalty is worth 3 points.  
Find the total number of points Jim scores in this season.

$$\begin{aligned} \text{Total score} &= (9 \times 5) + (24 \times 3) \\ &= 45 + 72 \\ &= 117 \text{ points} \end{aligned}$$

\*\* Accept correct answer with no work.

#### Misreading (Full Credit –1)

- Uses try = 3 points and penalty = 5 points and continues  
( $9 \times 3 = 27$ ;  $24 \times 5 = 120$ ;  $27 + 120 = 147$ )

#### Partial Credit

- Subtracts instead of adds ( $72 - 45 = 27$ )
- Calculates try points only (45) or penalty points only (72)
- Answer =  $5 + 3 = 8$  only
- Answer = 41 ( $9 + 5 + 24 + 3$ )

#### No Credit

- Answer =  $9 + 24 = 33$  points

(c)

Scale 5B\*

(0, 3, 5)

A rectangle is 20 m long and 35 m wide  
Find the length of the perimeter of the rectangle.

$$\text{Perimeter} = 20 \text{ m} + 20 \text{ m} + 35 \text{ m} + 35 \text{ m} = 110 \text{ m}$$

Or:  $20 \times 2 = 40$ ;  $35 \times 2 = 70$ ;  $40 + 70 = 110 \text{ m}$

\*\* Accept correct answer with no work.

\* Incorrect or omitted units.

*Partial Credit*

- Answer = 55 m and stops
- Omits one side (75m or 90m)
- Answer = 40 m and stops
- Answer = 70 m and stops
- Calculates area ( $20 \times 35 = 700$ )

*No Credit*

- Answer =  $35 \div 20 = 1.75$
- Answer =  $20 \div 35 = 0.5714285$

(d)

Scale 5B\*

(0, 3, 5)

A car travels 80 km in 1 hour and 20 minutes.  
Find the average speed of the car.

$$\text{Speed} = \frac{\text{Distance}}{\text{Time}} = \frac{80}{\left(1\frac{1}{3}\right)} = 60 \text{ km/hour}$$

\*\* Accept correct answer with no work.

\*\* Accept 1km/minute.

\* Incorrect or omitted units.

*Partial Credit*

- Answer =  $80 \times 1.33333333 = 106.66666666 \text{ km/hr}$
- Inverts  $\frac{80}{1.3333}$  and continues (0.01666666666625)
- Uses 1.2 for 1 hour and 20 mins (66.666666666667)
- Misplaced decimal
- One substitution, correct or incorrect  
(e.g.  $80 \div (60 + 20) = 80 \div 80 = 1$ ; or  $80 \div 120 = 2/3$ ; or  $120 \div 80 = 1.5$ )
- $80 \pm 1.3333333 = 81.333333$  or  $78.66666667$
- Mishandles fraction button on calculator (240km/hr)

(e)

Scale 5B\*

(0, 3, 5)

Given an exchange rate of €1 = \$1.3523 US dollars, convert €250 to dollars.

$$€250 \times 1.3523 = \$338.075 = \$338.08 \text{ US dollars}$$

\*\* Accept correct answer with no work.

\* Failure to round or incorrect rounding.

\* € used instead of \$. Do not apply \* if no sign is used.

*Partial Credit*

- Divides by 1.3523 (184.87)
- Inverts €250 (0.0054092)
- Misplaced decimal
- Answer = €250  $\pm$  1.3523 = 251.3523 or 248.6477

*No Credit*

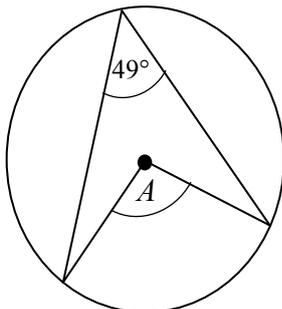
- Answer = €250 or 1.3523

(f)

Scale 5B\*

(0, 3, 5)

Find the value of  $A$ .



$$A = 49^\circ \times 2 = 98^\circ$$

\*\* Accept correct answer with no work.

\* Incorrect or omitted units.

*Partial Credit*

- $49^\circ \div 2 = 24.5^\circ$
- Answer =  $90^\circ$  or  $180^\circ$  or  $360^\circ$  without work
- Applied incorrect geometric relationship  
( $180 - 49 = 131^\circ$ ; or  $360 - 49 = 311^\circ$ ; or  $90 - 49 = 41^\circ$ )
- Measures angle with a protractor ( $102^\circ$ )

*No Credit*

- Answer =  $49^\circ$  and stops

(g)

Scale 5B

(0, 3, 5)

Write the number 16 666 to the nearest thousand.

17 000

\*\* Accept correct answer with no work.

\*\* Accept 17.

*Partial Credit*

- Answer corrected to the nearest hundred (16 700)
- Answer corrected to the nearest ten (16 670)
- Answer = 16 000, or 16 600, or 16 660, or 17 666

(h)

Scale 5B\*

(0, 3, 5)

In a sale all items are reduced by 30%.  
During the sale a pair of jeans sells for €17.50.  
Find the cost of the pair of jeans before the sale.

$€17.50 \div 70 \times 100 = €25$  or  $€17.50 \div 7 \times 10 = €25$

\*\* Accept correct answer with no work.

\* Failure to round or incorrect rounding.

*Partial Credit*

- Calculates 30% of €17.50 (5.25).
- Misplaced decimal
- Answer =  $17.50 + 5.25 = €22.75$
- Inverts 70% ( $17.50 \div 100 \times 70 = €12.25$ )
- Answer =  $€17.50 \pm 30 = €47.50$  or  $€12.50$
- Answer =  $17.50 \div 70$  (0.25)
- Answer =  $17.50 \div 30 \times 100 = €58.33$

(i) **Scale 5B\*** (0, 3, 5)

The heights of five students are 165 cm, 142 cm, 158 cm, 157 cm, and 169 cm.  
Find the average (mean) height of the five students.

$$\text{Average height} = \frac{165 + 142 + 158 + 157 + 169}{5} = \frac{791}{5} = 158.2 \text{ cm.}$$

\*\* Accept correct answer with no work.

\* Incorrect or omitted units.

\* Truncates answer to 158 cm even with no work.

*Partial Credit*

- Multiplies total by 5 (3955)
- Omission of division (791)
- Misplaced decimal
- Any indication of addition
- Multiplies one of the heights by 5
- List evident but height omitted
- Mishandles total on calculator (655·80)

*No Credit*

- Answer = 5
- Multiplies heights only
- Answer = any of the listed numbers with no work (except 158)

(j) **Scale 5B** (0, 3, 5)

Find  $3\frac{2}{3} \times 2\frac{1}{6}$

$$\frac{11}{3} \times \frac{13}{6} = \frac{143}{18} = 7\frac{17}{18} \quad \text{or} \quad 3.6666666666 \times 2.1666666666 = 7.94444444$$

\*\* Accept correct answer with no work.

\*\* Accept answer written as 143/18 or decimal form (7.94444444).

\*\* Accept equivalent of 143/18.

*Partial Credit*

- Misplaced decimal
- Incorrect denominator or numerator
- Divides fractions
- Adds or subtracts the fractions
- Answer = 6 and any fraction other than 2/3
- Mishandles fraction button on calculator (Answer = 2/3)

Gross Tax Credits =  $1650 + 1650 + 300 = €3600$

*High Partial Credit*

- List evident but omits one value ( $1650 + 1650 = 3300$ ; or  $1650 + 300 = 1950$ )
- Misplaced decimal
- Subtracts instead of adds ( $1650 + 1650 - 300 = 3000$ ; or  $1650 - 300 = 1350$ )

*Low Partial Credit*

- Answer = 1650 only or 300 only

(a) **Net Tax Credits**

Scale 5B

(0, 3, 5)

€3600

\*\* Accept correct answer without work.

\*\* Accept answer from (a) **Gross Tax Credits** above.

*Partial Credit*

- Omits one value when calculating
- Answer = 1650 or 300
- Answer =  $3600 \times 2 = 7200$
- Answer =  $32\ 800 - 3600 = 29\ 200$
- Answer = 32 800

€3600 ÷ 12 = €300

\*\* Accept correct answer without work.

*Partial Credit*

- Answer =  $2733·33 \div 12 = 227·7777$
- Uses  $32800 \div 12 = 2733·33$ ; or  $630·77 \div 12 = 56·730833$
- Fails to divide by 12
- Answer = 12
- Any use of €2733·33

**(b) Weekly** **Scale 5B** **(0, 3, 5)**

$$\text{€}3600 \div 52 = \text{€}69.23$$

\*\* Accept correct answer without work.

\*\* Accept candidate's answer from part (a).

*Partial Credit*

- Answer =  $630.77 \div 52 = 12.130192$
- Uses  $32800 \div 52 = 630.76923$ ; or  $2733.33 \div 52 = 52.5640$
- Fails to divide by 52
- Any use of  $\text{€}630.77$
- Answer = 52

**(c)** **Scale 5B, 5B** **(0, 3, 5) × 2**

This week Ian earned  $\text{€}610.00$ .

Find Ian's **gross tax** and Ian's **net tax** for this week.

**(c) Gross Tax** **Scale 5B** **(0, 3, 5)**

$$\text{€}610 \times 20\% = \text{€}122$$

\*\* Accept correct answer without work.

*Partial Credit*

- Uses 41% ( $250.10$ )
- Calculates 120% ( $732$ )
- Answer =  $\text{€}610 - \text{€}122 = \text{€}488$
- Calculates 141% ( $\text{€}860.10$ )
- Inverts 20% ( $3050$ )
- Inverts  $\text{€}610$
- Misplaced decimal
- Answer =  $610 \pm 20 = 630$  or  $590$
- Finds 20% of a relevant number

**(c) Net Tax** **Scale 5B** **(0, 3, 5)**

$$\text{€}122 - \text{€}69.23 = \text{€}52.77$$

\*\* Accept correct answer with no work.

\*\* Accept candidate's answer from part (c) **Gross Tax** and part (a).

*Partial Credit*

- Adds rather than subtracts tax credit ( $191.23$ )
- Answer =  $\text{€}610 - \text{€}69.23 = \text{€}540.77$
- Answer for **Gross Tax** given for **Net Tax**, and *vice versa*
- Uses monthly or yearly tax credit
- Truncates answer
- Misplaced decimal
- Calculates net pay ( $\text{€}610 - \text{€}52.77 = \text{€}557.23$ )
- Calculates 20% of **Gross Tax** ( $122 \times 20 \div 100 = 24.40$ ) and stops
- Answer =  $\text{€}69.23$  (credits only)
- Answer =  $\text{€}122$  (gross tax only)
- Any use of **Gross Tax**

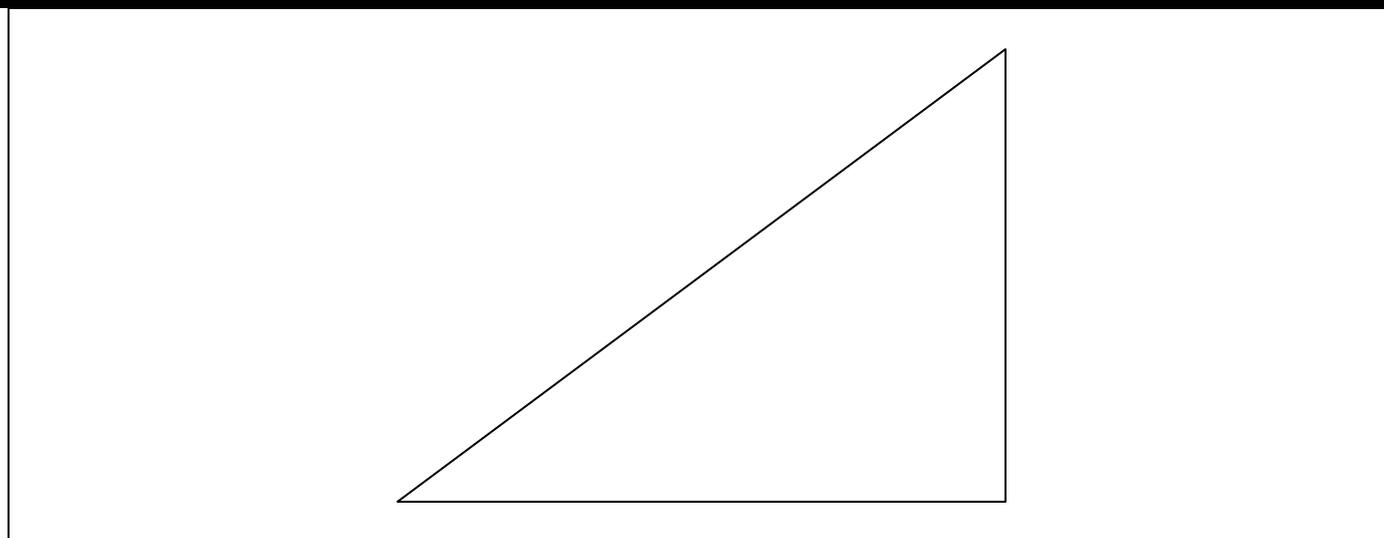
### QUESTION 3

(a)

Scale 15D

(0, 4, 7, 11, 15)

Construct a triangle in which one side is 8 cm, another side is 6 cm, and the angle between these two sides is  $90^\circ$ .



\*\* Tolerance  $\pm 0.1$  cm or  $\pm 5^\circ$ .

*Full Credit*

- All 4 measurements correct

*High Partial Credit*

- 3 measurements correct

*Middle Partial Credit*

- 2 measurements correct

*Low Partial Credit*

- 1 measurement correct
- Triangle not drawn with straight edge.

(b)

Scale 10B\*

(0, 5, 10)

Measure the length of the third side.

10 cm

*Note:* If no correct side or angle is drawn in part (a), for part (b) candidate must measure longest side.

\*\* Accept hypotenuse in candidate's diagram.

\*\* Tolerance  $\pm 0.1$  cm.

\*\* Accept correct answer with no diagram.

\* Incorrect or omitted units.

*Partial Credit*

- Side measured between tolerance 0.1 cm and 0.5 cm

*No Credit*

- Incorrect answer with no diagram
- Answer = 6 or 8, but not relevant to candidate's diagram

(c)

Scale 5C

(0, 2, 3, 5)

Use the lengths of the sides of your triangle to check the Theorem of Pythagoras.

*Theorem of Pythagoras: "In a right-angled triangle the square of the hypotenuse is the sum of the squares of the other two sides."*

$$6^2 + 8^2 = 10^2$$

$$36 + 64 = 100$$

$$100 = 100$$

\*\* Accept candidate's answer from part (b).

*High Partial Credit*

- Error in the application of Pythagoras (e.g.  $8^2 + 10^2 = 6^2$ )
- Correct substitution and stops
- Misplaced decimal
- $6^2 = 2(6)$  and continues
- No hypotenuse ( $6^2 + 8^2$ )
- Incorrect conclusion (e.g.  $100 = 89$ )

*Low Partial credit*

- Constructs a square on all sides of the triangle and stops
- States that the triangle is the same as 3, 4, 5 and Pythagoras works
- States it is true as triangle has a right angle
- Correct conclusion no work

(d)(i)

Scale 10B\*

(0, 5, 10)

A bathroom floor measures 3.75 m by 2.1 m.

Calculate the area of the floor.

$$\text{Area} = 3.75 \times 2.1 = 7.875 \text{ m}^2$$

\*\* Accept correct answer with no work.

\* Incorrect or omitted units.

*Partial Credit*

- Divides instead of multiplying ( $3.75 \div 2.1 = 1.7857142$ )
- Misplaced decimal
- Calculates perimeter ( $3.75 \times 2 = 7.5$ ;  $2.1 \times 2 = 4.2$ ;  $7.5 + 4.2 = 11.7$ )
- $3.5 + 2.1 = 5.85$

(d)(ii)

Scale 5C

(0, 2, 3, 5)

Square tiles of side 0.15 m are used to cover the floor.  
How many tiles are needed to cover the floor completely?

Area of tile =  $0.15 \times 0.15 = 0.0225 \text{ m}^2$   
Number of tiles =  $7.875 \text{ m}^2 \div 0.0225 \text{ m}^2 = 350$  tiles

Or:  $3.75 \div 0.15 = 25$   
 $2.1 \div 0.15 = 14$   
 $25 \times 14 = 350$  tiles

\*\* Accept correct with no work.

\*\* Accept candidate's answer from part (d)(i).

*High Partial Credit*

- Misplaced decimal
- Fails to divide floor area by the tile area having calculated both
- Truncates answer
- Answer = 25
- Answer = 14
- Answer =  $7.875 \div 0.15 = 52.5$

*Low partial Credit*

- Answer = Area of tile only (0.0225)
- Answer = Area of floor only (7.875)
- Some attempt to draw or count tiles or the floor
- Answer =  $7.875 \times 0.15 = 1.18125$

(d)(iii)

Scale 5C

(0, 2, 3, 5)

The tiles are sold in boxes.  
Each box contains 40 tiles, and costs €32.  
Only full boxes may be bought – it is not possible to buy part of a box of tiles.  
Find the total cost of the tiles.

$350 \div 40 = 8.75 \Rightarrow 9$  full boxes  
Cost of tiles =  $\text{€}32 \times 9 = \text{€}288$

\*\* Accept correct with no work.

\*\* Accept candidate's answer from part (d)(ii).

*High Partial Credit*

- Fails to round to full box
- Mishandles 40
- Mishandles €32
- Misplaced decimal
- Calculates correct amount of boxes only

*Low Partial Credit*

- Answer =  $40 \times \text{€}32$  and stops (1280)
- Answer =  $40 \div \text{€}32$  and stops (1.25)
- Answer =  $\text{€}32 \div 40$  and stops (0.8)

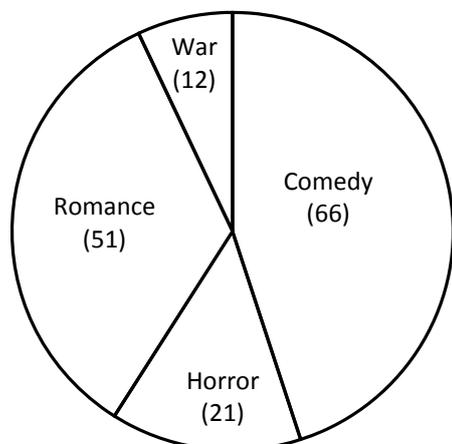

Pie Chart

*Partial Credit*

- Names another type of chart type (e.g. Trend /Bar/Histogram)

(b)

Scale 5C

(0, 2, 3, 5)

The number of students who picked each kind of film is shown in brackets on the graph.  
How many students were surveyed, in total?

$$12 + 51 + 66 + 21 = 150 \text{ students}$$

\*\* Accept correct answer with no work.

*High Partial Credit*

- List evident with one omission
- Subtracts instead of adds

*Low Partial Credit*

- Answer = one of the numbers from the pie chart

(c)

Scale 5C

(0, 2, 3, 5)

What percentage of students chose *Comedy* as their favourite type of film?

$$\frac{66}{150} \times \frac{100}{1} = 44\%$$

\*\* Accept correct answer with no work.

\*\* Accept candidate's answer from part (b).

*High Partial Credit*

- Inverts  $66 / 150$  ( $227.2727$ ) or  $150 / 100 \times 66 = 99\%$
- Misplaced decimal
- Uses other categories (e.g.  $12/150$ ) and continues

*Low Partial Credit*

- Answer =  $66\%$
- One substitution correct
- Any use of 100

(d)(i)

Scale 10C

(0, 3, 7, 10)

Five candidates stood for election to Dáil Éireann in a constituency with 3 seats.

The election was conducted under the PR system.

The total electorate, as contained in the Register of Electors, was 16 950.

The total poll was 12 500.

The number of spoiled votes (votes which were invalid) was 240.

Calculate the valid poll.

$$\text{Valid poll} = 12\,500 - 240 = 12\,260$$

\*\* Accept correct answer with no work.

*High Partial Credit*

- Adds instead of subtracts (12 740)
- Uses 16 950 and continues (16 710)
- Ignores 240 in calculation (12 500)

*Low Partial Credit*

- Answer =  $12\,500 \times 240$  (3 000 000)
- Answer = 240
- Answer =  $12\,500 \div 240$  ( $52.0833333$ )
- Answer =  $16\,950 + 12\,500$  (29 450)
- Answer =  $16\,950 - 12\,500$  (4450)

*No Credit*

- $16\,950 \div 3 = 5650$
- $16\,950 \div 5 = 3390$

(d)(ii)

Scale 10C\*

(0, 3, 7, 10)

Calculate the quota, using the formula in the box.

$$\text{Quota} = \frac{\text{valid poll}}{\text{number of seats} + 1} + 1$$

$$= \frac{12260}{3 + 1} + 1 = 3066$$

\*\* Accept candidate's answer for part (d)(i).

\*\* Accept correct answer with no work.
