N.B. In the Sections on Drama and Fiction, if a question contains alternatives, candidates **may not** attempt **both** alternatives in that question.

I. DRAMA

A MACBETH (Shakespeare)

(i) "Macbeth and his wife drive out pity and remorse from their natures and then find themselves isolated from and confronted by a world that has no pity for them."

Discuss this view, supporting your answer by reference to or quotation from the play.

OR

(ii) "Images of storm, blood and animals dramatically evoke an atmosphere of destruction and disorder in the play *Macbeth.*"

Discuss this statement, supporting your answer by reference to or quotation from the play.

B MURDER IN THE CATHEDRAL (Eliot)

(i) "Becket's supernatural insight places him in lonely contrast to his fellow men and women. He has a vision they do not share."

Discuss this statement, supporting your answer by reference to or quotation from the play.

OR

(ii) Discuss the part played by The Chorus in the play, Murder in the Cathedral.

C PHILADELPHIA HERE I COME (Friel)

(i) "Hope and disillusionment compete for supremacy in Philadelphia Here I Come."

Discuss this view, supporting your answer by reference to or quotation from the play.

OR

(ii) "Philadelphia Here I Come brilliantly dramatises conflicting views of the past."

Discuss this statement, supporting your answer by reference to or quotation from the play.

D SAINT JOAN (Shaw)

(i) "Joan -- practical, uncompromising, inspiring, spiritual -- is an excellent example of Shaw's ability to create complex characters."

Discuss this statement, supporting your answer by reference to or quotation from the play.

OR

(ii) "In the play Saint Joan, Shaw even-handedly weighs the claims of private judgement against the demands of obedience and authority."

Discuss this statement, supporting your answer by reference to or quotation from the play.

II. POETRY

from Paradise Lost, Book 1, Lines 587 - 621

Thus far these beyond Compare of mortal prowess, yet observed Their dread Commander. He, above the rest In shape and gesture proudly eminent, 590 Stood like a tower; his form had yet not lost All her original brightness, nor appeared Less than Archangel ruined, and the excess Of glory obscured: as when the sun new-risen Looks through the horizontal misty air 595 Shorn of his beams, or from behind the moon, In dim eclipse, disastrous twilight sheds On half the nations, and with fear of change Perplexes monarchs. Darkened so, yet shone Above them all the Archangel: but his face 600 Deep scars of thunder had intrenched, and care Sat on his faded cheek, but under brows Of dauntless courage, and considerate pride Waiting revenge. Cruel his eye, but cast Signs of remorse and passion, to behold 605 The fellows of his crime, the followers rather (Far other once beheld in bliss), condemned For ever now to have their lot in pain;

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Millions of Spirits for his fault amerc'd	
Of Heaven, and from eternal splendours flung	610
For his revolt; yet faithful how they stood,	
Their glory withered : as, when Heaven's fire	
Hath scathed the forest oaks or mountain pines,	
With singèd top their stately growth, though bare,	
Stands on the blasted heath. He now prepared	615
To speak; whereat their doubled ranks they bend	
From wing to wing, and half enclose him round	
With all his peers : attention held them mute.

(i) What qualities of Satan's character are presented to us in the above extract?
Support your answer by relevant quotation or reference.

- (ii) Identify one feature of Milton's style which is evident in the above extract and comment on its effectiveness.
- (iii) Answer ONE of the following:-
 - (a) Discuss the relationship between the fallen angels and "their dread Commander" as revealed in the above extract.
 - (b) Compare and contrast the characters of Satan and Beelzebub as shown in Paradise Lost, Book 1.
 - (c) Briefly discuss Satan's power as an orator as demonstrated by one of his speeches in Paradise Lost, Book 1.
- B "Deep emotional conflicts are beautifully articulated in Tennyson's Choric Song of the Lotus-Eaters."
 - Discuss this view, supporting your answer by relevant quotation or reference.
- C "In his poetry, Dylan Thomas celebrates life and defies death in a style which is exciting and stirring."
 - Discuss this view, supporting your answer by quotation from or reference to the poems by Thomas on your course.
- D "With great subtlety, Clarke's poetry examines the tensions and contrasts of Irish life."
 - Discuss this statement, supporting your answer by quotation from or reference to the poems by Clarke on your course.
- E Choose any two poets on your course and discuss aspects of their poetry which make it great in your opinion.
 - Support the points you make by reference to or quotation from the work of each poet.
 - (N.B. You may not select a poet on whom you have already answered in this Section.)

III. FICTION

A HARD TIMES (Dickens)

(i) "The opposition between fact and fancy is central to the novel Hard Times."

Discuss this statement, supporting the points you make by appropriate reference to the novel.

OR

(ii) "Though he is a victim of his father's philosophy of education, young Thomas Gradgrind by his actions takes himself beyond our pity."

Discuss this statement in its entirety, supporting your answer by appropriate reference to the novel.

B THE MAYOR OF CASTERBRIDGE (Hardy)

(i) "In *The Mayor of Casterbridge* Henchard's potential for self-destruction is clearly revealed."

Discuss this statement, supporting your answer by suitable reference to the novel.

OR

(ii) "The impossibility of escaping from the past is a central theme of *The Mayor of Casterbridge.*"

Discuss this view, supporting your answer by suitable reference to the novel.

C THE MODERN NOVEL

(**N.B.** In answering either of the following questions on the modern novel, you may <u>not</u> take either *Hard Times* or *The Mayor of Casterbridge* as a modern novel.)

(i) "The ideal vision of life aspired to in the Modern Novel is soon distorted by life's realities."

Discuss this view, supporting your answer by reference to **one or more** of the modern novels on your course.

OR

(ii) "Characters in the modern novel are more interesting than admirable."

Do you agree with this statement?

Support the points you make by reference to one or more of the modern novels on your course.
