- **N.B.** Candidates may NOT answer a Question A and a Question B on the same text.


SECTION II — COMPOSING

SECTION I COMPREHENDING (100 marks)

TEXT 1 My Future . . .

This is an interview with a Sixth Year student, named Sarah. She is asked about herself; her past, her future plans, hopes, and ambitions. The interview appeared in her school's graduation night magazine.



Q1. What positive memory will stay with you as you grow older?

A. My best memories were taking part in school shows – in particular, "Grease"! The absolute thrill of being on stage and performing for people – it still makes my heart beat fast. I'd so love to do it again. I think of the fun we had, the terrible nerves and the great friendships that came from it. And I'll always remember the climax, the last night of the performance: then suddenly the anti-climax. It's over and we'll never do it again. Tears come into my eyes even now!

But I'll never forget those times. And maybe in years to come when my grandchildren are sitting on my knee and we're watching Olivia Newton-John on TV, I can look at them and say there was a time when I had long black hair and fitted into those P.V.C. pants!

Q2. What hopes do you have for the world? Can you see yourself making any difference to the world, however small?

A. I can't see the world changing that much in my lifetime. I would love if there was peace and unity between everyone everywhere. I'd like to see a world ban on landmines and something done about the health of children in the Third World.

As for me, I might make a difference to the world if I go into the area of science in college. It's difficult to know your future but I'd like to get involved in inventing things to help the people of Africa, in particular. I saw a programme about a radio that worked without batteries and I thought I'd like to invent something like that.

Q3. What skills do you have and how do you think they will help your future life?

A. Well, I know I have good communication skills because doing speech and drama has helped me with that. I suppose these skills will help me if I'm going for a job interview. And in life in general you have to be able to interact and get on with people - I think I can manage that! Also I'd say I was a good listener (well maybe you should ask my friends) and I think this will help me to learn and to continue to develop myself as a person. Friendliness and tolerance (up to a point!) are skills I also have. I see these being particularly useful in the work situation. In the future being able to get along as part of a team will be very important.

Q4. What would you like to do for the next four years?

A. What a broad question! Ideally, I'd like to go to college here in the town and I wouldn't mind having a career lined up after four years. But there's another little piece inside me that wants to go a bit crazy for a year – maybe off to Canada or Australia to my sister in Sydney. I'd love to try for a part in a musical there so that I could get that "buzz" from acting again. Ideally, I'd like to explore different paths and not feel under pressure to get a certificate. Just for a while I'd like to have no watch and be disorganised!!! Stuck to no time limits or final dates.

- (iv) In her answer to question 3, Sarah says she has "good communication skills". From what you have read of the whole interview do you agree with her opinion of herself? Give reasons for your answer.

TEXT 2 THE FUTURE IS HERE . . .

The following is adapted from an article by Peter Cunningham. It first appeared in the Irish Independent, October 11, 2000.

The writer has experienced the new "computerised hotel" on his travels in France. If these new hotels are a sign of the future then he is not in favour of it.



- 1. The time is fast approaching when direct human contact, like a smile or a handshake, will be a thing of the past. These days when you ring a company you are more likely to be answered by a tape recorded voice rather than a real person. The same goes for booking a theatre or a concert ticket; the robot's voice is everywhere.
- 2. The Internet, that monster created by the computer, is fast replacing human contact. Now, it seems we are ruled by machines. And yet, although nowadays you may make your hotel reservation by Internet, at least on reaching your hotel you will be greeted by another member of the flesh and blood brigade won't you?

Let me break the news gently; not any more.

3. The fully computerised hotel has arrived. In place of the kind welcome of the hotel receptionist whose gentle smile makes the journey you have made seem worthwhile, there is a smudgy keypad and a fuzzy screen...and silence.

- 4. Recently I made the journey to France by ship on the M.V. Normandy. Now there's a good old fashioned workhorse of a ship sailing ten months of the year between Rosslare and Cherbourg. Nothing flash. Nice reliable people running it – even asked me if I'd like an Irish paper to read. They made me feel cared for and important.
- 5. I intended to drive to the South of France but there was an accident somewhere on the motorway which led to a thirty mile tailback so I had to spend the night in the city of Orleans. It was past midnight and raining as I reached the outskirts of the city looking for a place to stay. I pulled up at the door of one hotel – the sign said "Full". Five hotels later and the story was still the same. And then from the corner of my eye, stuck in behind a closed pizzeria and a warehouse, I saw what looked like a heap of big plastic boxes heaped one on the other. A passer-by assured me it was a hotel.
- 6. This "Hotel" my tongue fights not to say the word is run by a computer. That's right. No people. No nice offers of the newspaper. Just a big TV screen near the front door. In goes my credit card. "We have 3 rooms left. Do you wish to proceed?" And so on. I took a room and entered.
- 7. Now I've stayed in some bad hotels in my time but nothing came close to this. Even the flea pit in the Gulf of Siam whose layout looked like the doodlings of a mad budgie, even it had nice people running it. But this place was eerily quiet as I walked to my bedroom door. Another code opened it and it shut behind me like the door of a cell. Inside, the walls were made of cream, moulded plastic and so was the bedside locker, the toilet and the shower. I kept waking every half hour for fear I would smother in this plastic box. I left before dawn next morning and as I did so I could swear that a computer-enhanced voice said "Have a nice day!". If this is the future I'll stick to the past!

Question B


