GENERAL PRINCIPLES

SECTIONS A + D (Short Answer Questions **5 Marks x 8**)

Core = basic element of fact or relevant answer = 5 Marks

Questions involving judgment in the answer may be awarded from 1 mark to 5 marks.

<u>Marking</u> = 8 items. (If more than 8 attempted, award 8 highest) 8x 5 marks = 40 Marks

SECTIONS B + E (Paragraph Questions – 20 Marks x 2= 40 Marks)

Marking

Cumulative Mark (CM) = 15 Marks

- Break up the paragraph into points using ticks.
- Put a tick at the end of the final word of the completed point.
- Award each completed point 5 marks.
- The final point in a paragraph may be marked as follows:

Very Good: 4-5. Good: 2-3. Poor: 0-1.

Definition of a point

- (a) A relevant significant statement <u>or</u> an explanation, comment, opinion.
- (b) A relevant significant introductory statement.

A relevant significant concluding statement.

Overall Mark (OM) = 5 Marks.

Review the answer in the context of the given question and award a mark using the following rating:

Very Good: 4-5. Good: 2-3. Poor: 0-1.

SECTIONS C+F (Essay Questions – 60 Marks x 2= 120 Marks)

Marking

Cumulative Mark (CM) = 50 Marks

Break up the answer into points (as already defined) using ticks.

Put a tick at the end of the final word of the completed point.

Award each tick 5 marks.

One single point on its own at the end may merit up to 5 marks.

A relevant introductory paragraph may be awarded a max of 10 marks.

A relevant concluding paragraph may be awarded a max of 10 marks.

Overall Mark (OM) = 10 Marks.

Review the answer in the context of the given question and title. Award marks using the following rating:

<u>Very Good</u>: 8-10 A coherent presentation of the main relevant points.

Average: 4-7 A standard but unexceptional presentation of some relevant points.

<u>Poor:</u> 1-3 An attempt but with identifiable defects.

Mark as per General Principles for Essay Questions.

Section F (60 marks x = 120 marks)

Mark as per General Principles for Essay Questions.
