# **TEACHERS' PAPER;**

- 1. The examination has been designed to enable the students to work through the creative process of **Investigation**, **Documentation**, **Experimentation** and the **Realization** of a product.
- 2. Art teachers are required to stress the following points:
  - a. Creative and thoughtful considerations are essential to deal effectively with questions from both **SECTION A** and **SECTION B**.
  - b. These considerations should have a direct bearing on the quality of the students' final work, and should be reflected in preliminary studies made in connection with both **SECTION A** and **SECTION B**.
  - c. Preliminary studies are to be handed in together with the final works.
- 3. The questions in **SECTION B** may be interpreted in any one of the following forms:
  - Painting in colour
  - Print Making
  - Textiles
  - Collage
  - Three-dimensional work
- 4. Students are to be helped to organize the extended time given to their best advantage.
- 5. All teachers are expected to explain the contents of the examination paper.
- 6. The Art examination is to be conducted during the Art lesson in the period from the 8<sup>th</sup> May to 2<sup>nd</sup> June 2006
- ART TEACHERS ARE EXPECTED TO MAKE USE OF THE MARKING SCHEMES PRESENTED WITH THIS PAPER TO ASSESS THE STUDENTS' COMPETENCIES.

### **SECTION A: Drawing or Painting from Observation**

The Art Teacher is to set up one or more arrangements of four objects each, chosen from the following list:

Gardening tools	Umbrella	Box
Framed mirror	Reflecting objects	Grapes
4 Plates on top of each other	Bananas	Pottery
3 Books on top of each other	Glass object	Clock

# **SECTION B**: Composition from a Theme.

The students are asked to consider the following starting points:

- 1. **'PEOPLE IN THE SUN'** is a picture by Edward Hopper showing a group of people sitting silently in armchairs enjoying the strong warm sunlight. It could be siesta time. Make a picture in which one or more persons are resting and relaxing in surroundings familiar to you. (Pic. No.1)
- 2. Last November about 53 nations participated in the **CHOGM Conference** held in Malta. One of the aims of this meeting was **'FRIENDSHIP AND CO-OPERATION BETWEEN NATIONS'**. Make a design for a school mural to commemorate this event.
- 3. Design a poster entitled 'MALTESE FOLKLORE'. The aim of this poster is to make people aware about our traditional heritage and to encourage them to visit the folklore museum.
- 4. **'SALT-PANS'** is a theme which features recurrently in the work of Maltese artist Harry Alden. These seashore features which can be encountered in several low-lying rocky shores around Malta form an interesting pattern. In his painting Alden weaves his way into the distance by means of a patchwork of colours. Considering Alden's work make a painting featuring these salt-pans. (Pic. No.2)
- 5. **'FURNITURE'**: Study particular shapes and forms in furniture such as chairs, tables, headboards, cupboards, wardrobes...etc. and evolve an abstract composition taking into account line, shape, form, colour, texture, pattern and rhythm.
- THE STUDENTS ARE ASKED TO CHOOSE ONE THEME AND DEVELOP IT INTO A FINAL WORK.
- THE STUDENTS' WORK IS EXPECTED TO BE THE RESULT OF THE CREATIVE PROCESS.

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# **INSTRUCTIONS TO STUDENTS**

- 1. Read the questions carefully and consider which of them will be suitable for your competence and interest.
- 2. You are expected to show that your work goes through the process of **Investigation, Documentation, Experimentation** and **Realization**.
- 3. **Preliminary studies** are required to answer both **SECTION A** and **SECTION B.** Therefore Preliminary studies are to be handed in with your final work. Failure to do so will lose you marks.
- 4. Two questions are to be attempted, one question from **SECTION A**, and one from **SECTION B**.
  - 5. The questions in **SECTION B** may be interpreted in any one of the following forms:
    - Painting in colour
    - Print Making
    - Textiles
    - Collage
    - Three-dimensional work
- 6. Any reference material (primary or secondary sources) may be used. But mere copying is unacceptable.
- 7. Write the following information clearly on the back of your work:
  - a) Name and Surname
  - b) School and Class
  - c) Section (A or B) and question number.

# **SECTION A : Drawing or Painting from Observation**

A selection of four objects from the following list is arranged before you.

Gardening tools	Umbrella	Box
Framed mirror	Reflecting objects	Grapes
4 Plates on top of each other	Bananas	Pottery
3 Books on top of each other	Glass object	Clock

Study the group of objects placed before you. Make use of **preliminary studies** to show the organization of **light** and **shadow, forms**, **colour** and **textures**. Produce a painting or drawing of the group.
