  - the passage as performed on stage,
  - interesting and effective use of language.

Helena	O spite! O Hell! I see you all are bent To set against me for your merriment. If you were civil, and knew courtesy, You would not do me thus much injury. Can you not hate me, as I know you do, But you must join in souls to mock me too? If you were men, as men you are in show, You would not use a gentle lady so, To vow, and swear, and superpraise my parts, When I am sure you hate me with your hearts.

- 4. Write an essay about the significance of this passage in the play. You may wish to concentrate on two or more of the following topics which are offered as a guide:

- 5. With reference to the part of the play you have covered so far, write about the change in the relationship between Macbeth and Lady Macbeth after the assassination of Duncan.
- 6. Discuss the role of the Witches in the play.

## Burning Everest and Mariza's Story

- 7. In *Burning Everest*, Jim tells Tony, "I didn't ask them to have me." Show how Jim reacts to being fostered by the Wellands.
- 8. In *Mariza's Story*, we are given a clear picture of the life the poor people of Brazil lead when they live on the streets. With reference to particular episodes and characters, show how the writer presents this picture of poverty.
- 9. Both Jim and Mariza suffer because of decisions made by adults. Discuss this statement with reference to particular episodes and characters in the two plays.

## <u>The Glass Menagerie</u>

- 10. Laura and Tom both escape from reality into a world of their own. Write about their escape from reality bringing out clearly why and how they do so.
- 11. Amanda says, "My devotion has made me a witch and so I made myself hateful to my children." Write about Amanda's character and her relationship with her children.
- 12. Why is the play called "The Glass Menagerie"?

#### **SECTION B - POETRY**

- 13. With reference to TWO poets in the anthology, show how they treat the same subject in different ways. You may write about some or all of the following: special use of language, word pictures, sounds and smells, and comparisons.
- 14. When we read poetry, it arouses in us different feelings. Write about ONE poem which has made you feel happy and ONE poem which has made you feel sad. By examining the poet's use of language and other features of style, show why each of these poems made you feel this way.
- 15. You have been asked to write a literary article for a school magazine. Choose TWO poems you think students would enjoy reading and write about the features that make them enjoyable.

## Lord of the Flies

- 16. Imagine that you are one of the survivors in the novel. You have been asked to write a newspaper article about the killing of Piggy and what led to it. Write a detailed report of this episode.
- 17. Compare and contrast the characters of Ralph and Jack in the novel.

#### Into the Wind

- 18. Some of the stories explore the theme of racism. By referring to TWO of the short stories in the collection, show how characters have to struggle against racial prejudice and rejection.
- 19. The theme of the search for freedom is developed in a number of short stories in the collection. By referring to TWO of them, show how characters try to win their freedom.

## Stories Then and Now

- 20. Which story in the collection would you recommend to a friend? Give reasons for your choice.
- 21. Describe TWO striking episodes taken from TWO different stories, bringing out what impressed you.
