Instructions for the conduct of the Listening Comprehension Examination

The teacher should instruct the candidates to answer the questions on the paper provided. The following procedure for reading the Listening Comprehension passage is to be explained to the candidates immediately before proceeding with the examination.

You have been given a sheet containing the Listening Comprehension questions. You will be given three minutes to read the questions based on the passage. I shall then read the passage at normal reading speed. You may take notes during the reading. After this reading there will be a pause of another three minutes to enable you to answer some of the questions. The passage will be read a second time and you may take further notes and answer the rest of the questions. After this second reading you will be given a further three minutes for a final revision of answers.

- a. 3 minutes Read questions
- b. 3 minutes First reading aloud of passage while students take notes
- c. 3 minutes Answer questions
- d. 3 minutes Second reading of passage and possibility to answer questions
- e. 3 minutes Final revision

A WALK IN THE WOODS

Our house is practically on the edge of the woods: a little cottage with bay windows and a thatched roof. I have been taking my dog Toby for a walk in the woods ever since we got him as a pup and that was seven years ago. I've never got lost, lost Toby or been afraid even when we go under a canopy of branches and it goes all dark. Toby seems to love searching in all the holes trying to smell out rabbits and barking up trees at squirrels and birds.

But today was different. We set off for our early walk at 7 a.m. before I had to go to school. I let Toby off the lead and threw his ball for him. He went chasing after it and brought it back and then the whining began. I thought he had something in his paw so I checked. Nothing. I threw his ball again, but he didn't do anything, just trotted along beside me looking all around him. I wondered what was wrong with him, but I just kept throwing the ball, trying to get him interested.

A rabbit went hopping by behind us. Normally he would have chased it and barked but he did nothing. I was beginning to feel a bit uneasy as the squirrels started rushing about in the trees and the birds all flew from their resting places. Rabbits scurried into their burrows. Now this was really strange and in a way, scary. At every little noise I turned round and now my stomach had butterflies.

What was this thing that terrified the animals and made me feel so scared? I got out of that wood so fast my feet hardly touched the ground.

Next morning I went back with Toby and everything was the same as usual. Toby rabbiting and barking up the trees and squirrels who were collecting nuts. Rabbits were playing together and the birds were once again flitting through the trees.

Dave Kunst is the first person on record to walk around the world. It took him four years, three months and sixteen days. Dave walked 14,450 miles crossing four continents and thirteen countries. He walked more than twenty million steps and <u>wore out</u> twenty-one pairs of shoes. However, he couldn't have done <u>it</u> without the help of his two brothers, John and Pete, and an Australian schoolteacher, Jenni Samuel.

Dave and John, along with a pack mule named Willie Makeit, set out from Minnesota on 20 June 1970. They had with them a piece of paper, on which they would collect stamps and signatures from the mayors of every town or city they visited. They had an uneventful walk to New York City, where they boarded a plane to Lisbon, Portugal.

- In Europe they had some wonderful experiences. In Italy they had an amusing incident with Willie in a restaurant. The owner made the mistake of inviting Willie inside, <u>where</u> he caused <u>chaos</u> by bumping into tables and spilling drinks. However, nobody seemed to mind and even the owner was laughing.
- The earthwalkers were quite surprised by how friendly and helpful people were. In Turkey they were offered a wagon to carry the water and food they needed to cross the deserts of Iran. A camel driver wanted to trade his camel for Willie, but Dave and John didn't even consider the offer, as they were far too attached to their four-legged travelling companion.

This proved to be a good decision, as after the desert they had to deal with the mountainous landscape of Afghanistan, which was the most perilous part of the journey. In the foothills of the Afghan mountains they were attacked by mountain robbers. Dave was seriously wounded and John was shot and killed.

It took Dave four months to pull through and continue his journey. His other brother, Pete, joined Dave on his walk through Asia. Then, they walked across India and finally reached the Indian Ocean.
Unfortunately, this is where they had to leave Willie behind because he wasn't allowed to cross over to Australia. But as soon as they set foot in Perth, they were given another mule, which they called Willie Makeit 2.

Halfway across Australia Pete had to return to America because of his job. Unfortunately, the difficult walk across the Australian outback was too much for Willie 2, who died of a heart attack.

Dave wasn't on his own for long. He met Jenni Samuel, who offered to help him out by pulling the wagon with her car to Sydney. As soon as he reached the Pacific Ocean, he flew back to America for the <u>final leg</u> of his walk. On 5 October 1974 Dave Kunst walked back into Minnesota and his name was added to the Guinness Book of Records.



When it was all over, he returned to Australia to meet up with Jenni again. A year later they returned to America, where they got married. Nowadays, Dave tells his amazing story to schoolchildren and adults. In 1996 he was chosen to carry the torch for the centennial Olympic Games in Atlanta.


