QUESTION 4 ADVERTISING

 The word INSIST means to demand and implies that the reader has the right to know more about the product / has the right to demand the best product. The huge lettering of the word makes it appear to be an instruction.

 (Mark globally.)
- 4.2 He wants to give the reader the idea that his product is superior to any other product on the market. His product is superior because it is made from genuine materials and is not manufactured by machine but by hand. When a product is handcrafted, greater care is taken. Each individual shoe is given attention by the manufacturer (Mark globally.)
- 4.3 The product is made in South Africa. The advertiser wishes to capitalise on the feeling of patriotism. If the product is made in South Africa it should be cheaper than other similar products. The product will be full value for money. (Two separate points to be given) 1 + 1 = 2

4.4	The shoe is what is being advertised so it is prominently displayed. All the claims project how good a product it is. The reader is made aware of the durability of the product. The reader also assumes that the products used to manufacture the shoe mean that the advertiser will not be embarrassed by the product. The shoe is crafted to enable the young child's feet to grow without doing any damage. (Mark globally.)	(3)
