Together with the adjacent Gemsbok National Park, this park comprises an area of over 3,6 million hectares, one of the very few conservation areas of this magnitude left in the world. Red sand dunes, sparse vegetation and dry riverbeds of the Nossob and Auob show antelope and predator species off at a premium and provide excellent photographic opportunities. For social development South Africa was placed 126th, making it one of the lowest ranking states in this category. The indicator used data from newspapers, computers, television and total crimes recorded.



ADDENDUM B FLYING NAMIBIA

Highlights of Namibia

DAY 1: Depart to Fish River Canyon

The first leg of the journey takes you from Windhoek across the magnificent mountain range towards the far south of Namibia. Enjoy the Hardap Dam, the Kalahari Desert, the extinct Brukkaros Volcano and the vast intriguing plains of the south from a bird's eye view. Our destination is the magnificent boulder-studded plains and hills to the east of the great Fish River Canyon, second largest of its kind in the world.

DAY 2: Fish River Canyon

A scenic flight takes us up the steep and winding gorges of the Fish River Canyon, over the fascinating landscapes of the pro-Namib to Sesriem, the gateway to the southern Namib Desert and its magnificent dune belts. Sossusviei Lodge

DAY 3: Sossusvlei

Visit Sossusvlei, a clay pan surrounded by some of the highest sand dunes in the world. Observe the fauna and flora that inhabits this region. Time will be taken to explore the impressive sandstone conglomerate gorges of the Sesriem Canyon, formed by the Tsauchab River. A low-level flight takes us to the Atlantic Ocean, across the dune desert to Swakopmund Airport, followed by a short transfer to your hotel. Hansa Hotel

DAY 4: Walvis Bay

A transfer takes us to Walvis Bay where we embark on a half-day marine cruise. This provides us with a glimpse of Namibia's only deep sea harbour, encounters with aquatic birds and Cape Fur Seals, and the opportunity of sighting Bottlenose and heavy-side dolphins. The latter, a species endemic to the coast of south-western Africa. Namibian Oysters, counted amongst the best in the world, canapés and chilled sparkling wine from South Africa as well as soft drinks are served on board during this leisure cruise. Late afternoon our charter flight takes us north for an hour's flight along the Skeleton Coast, flying over the seal colony at Cape Cross, shipwrecks, the Messum Crater and the riverbeds of Namibia's ephemeral waterways.

DAY 5: Twyfelfontein

The slopes of Twyfelfontein are strewn with boulders. We spend the morning visiting the area dotted with thousands of paintings and ancient engravings, a virtual open-air museum. Geological features in the area include the Organ Pipes, angular columns of dolerite which are all part of Namibia's rich natural history. After lunch, our journey continues, cutting across the northern interior of the country to Mokuti, situated at the eastern gate of the Etosha National Park. Dinner at the lodge while we listen to local folklore of the area. **Mokuti Lodge**

DAY 6: Etosha National Park

The game and birds bund here are typical of the savannah plains of Southern Africa, but include several species endemic to the western side of the continent, adjacent to the Namib Desert. Among the rarer species, Black and White Rhino (recently reintroduced) are frequently seen. Black-faced Impala are restricted to Namibia and southern Angola and the Damara Dik-Dik; the Park's smallest antelope is also endemic. Hundreds of bird species have been recorded, with many migrants during the summer period. Participate in early morning and afternoon guided game drives into the Etosha National Park.

DAY 7: Return to Windhoek

After a leisurely breakfast, we board our aircraft for the final flight back to Windhoek.


