Scoring of Multiple-Choice Questions

Rating of Essays

- (1) Follow your school's procedures for training for rating. This process should include: *Introduction to the task—*
 - Raters read the task and summarize its purpose, audience, and format
 - Raters read passage(s) and plan own response to task
 - Raters share response plans and summarize expectations for student responses

Introduction to the rubric and anchor papers—

- Trainer reviews rubric with reference to the task
- Trainer reviews procedures for assigning scores
- Trainer leads review of each anchor paper and commentary (Note: Anchor papers are ordered from high to low within each score level.)

Practice scoring individually—

- Raters score a set of five papers individually
- Trainer records scores and leads discussion until raters feel confident enough to move on to actual scoring
- (2) When actual rating begins, each rater should record his or her individual rating for a student's essay on the rating sheet provided, *not* directly on the student's essay or answer sheet. Do *not* correct the student's work by making insertions or changes of any kind.
- (3) Each essay must be rated by at least two raters; a third rater will be necessary to resolve scores that differ by more than one point. The scoring coordinator will be responsible for coordinating the movement of papers, calculating a final score for each student's essay, and recording that information on the student's answer paper for Session One.

The invention of the electric quitar during the 1920's Was a Key step in the development and progression of American music which went on to influence several generations. Before the invention of the electric quitar in the 1920's, compositions by accoustic quitar composers such as Vivaldi or Bocharini defined the type of sand that could be achieved by a quitar. But once the electric quitar was invented, music history would be changed forever. Long before the invention of the electric quitar in the 1920's, music executives had been looking towards creating new types of amplifiers and speakers to boost the volume of accaustic quitars. In fact, innovations in quitar design had been developing since before the Civil War. But during the Big Band music movement of the 1920's and the development of connercial radio, the need for a louder quitar in bands who played in loud music halls became essential. There was no way to boost the saind of an accaustic quitar using a single microphone for a whole band, so the quitar was plugged into amplifiers to boost its volume. The idea of amplifying the quitor's natural sound using new speaked seemed like it would work but early electric quitais faced technological problems. When the hollow body of the quitar was combined with an electromagnetic pickup, the combination often produced reverberations and feedback which destroyed the sound completely. To solve some of these issues, quitar makers began to replace the million hollow body of electric quitars with a solid body to decrease the feedback and reverberations. As the quality of electric quitars improved, quitar makers were able to focus on the aesthetic aspects of the electric quitars. The solid body that was developed allowed the quitar maker's to experiment with different body shapes. Some U of the quitar designs of the 1950's

such as the Stratocaster or the Gibson Flying V were able to achieve a new, more modernistic look for the quitars. In Fact, world renowned electric quitarist Jimi Hendrix Unsed and endorsed the utilization of modern shaped quitors like the Gibson Flying V; which popularized electric guitars in American society even further. Therefore, through the invention of the electric quitar, American music history was revolutionized forever. The invention of the electric quitar has also helped to shape contemporary music in some negative yet mainly positive ways. Some music that includes electric quitar has been criticized by quitar traditionalists who argue that quitar is meant to "have the" warm, lush sound" provided by accoustic quitar and that electric quitar alters the instruments' pure, authentic tone". However, these traditionalists are rare in contemporary society as more people begin to appreciate electric quitar tone and more electric quitar is used in popular music.) Electric quitar has mainly benefitted the American music industry by influencing new genres of music to be developed. Indeed, jazz guitar is still alive in many jazz compositions while electric quitar has directly influenced the development of smooth and fusion jazz genres. The creation of the Heavy Metal jazz genre has also begun as a result of the techniques that Jare only accessible using an electric guitar. To achieve an excessively low note, referred to as 'dive bombing', one must utilize the electric quitar. Eddie Van Haten of the band 'van Haten' used electric quitar in his 'dive-bonbing' inflected heavy metal songs. The creation of the rock and roll genre during the 1950's would not even have been able to exist without the electric quitar which takes the forefront in most rock and roll songs. 


