So the difference is one of location relative to the course of a river. 3 marks for correct definitions; fourth mark for some explicit comments about difference (location).	(4)

3(b) (ii)	Reduces risks of soil erosion and landslides; saves having to import timber, particularly for fuel; protection of biodiversity. 1mark for each argument, plus 1 mark for explanation.	(6)
