IMPORTANT NOTICE

Cambridge International Examinations (CIE) in the UK and USA

With effect from the June 2003 examination Cambridge International Examinations will only accept entries in the UK and USA from students registered on courses at CIE registered Centres.

UK and USA private candidates will not be eligible to enter CIE examinations unless they are repatriating from outside the UK/USA and are part way through a course leading to a CIE examination. In that case a letter of support from the Principal of the school which they had attended is required. Other UK and USA private candidates should not embark on courses leading to a CIE examination after June 2003.

This regulation applies only to entry by private candidates in the UK and USA. Entry by private candidates through Centres in other countries is not affected.

AIMS

The aims of the syllabus are to:

- 1. develop an interest and enthusiasm for the study of Islam
- 2. introduce candidates to the basic teachings of the Qur'an and Hadith, and to pre-Islamic and Islamic religious life
- 3. help candidates identify and explore the religious and ethical issues raised in the Qur'an and by Prophet Muhammad (pbuh).

ASSESSMENT OBJECTIVES

The examination will assess the candidate's ability to:

- 1. demonstrate knowledge and understanding of the major themes of the syllabus and of the specified texts
- 2. apply historical and other relevant knowledge for example, in explaining the development of Islam and its beliefs, practices and traditions
- 3. demonstrate the effects of Islam on the behaviour of believers.

ASSESSMENT SCHEME

There will be one question paper of two and a half $(2^{1}/_{2})$ hours' duration, comprising two parts, Part I and Part II. Candidates will be required to answer **five** questions in all, from a total of 12 questions, choosing at least two from each part.
