6(c)	<u>Answers are likely to refer to such views as:-</u> Muslims follow the Prophet in caring about the weak. Although there are no slaves, there are servants and these are generally treated with kindness. /The third pillar of Islam is Zakah, regular, sacrificial giving which all devout Muslims observe. They also make voluntary payments known as sadaqah. /The Qur'an expresses abhorrence of the neglect of widows, who are often bracketed with orphans as some of the most needy in society. (Other approaches are possible and should be rewarded accordingly)	(6) <u>18</u>

7(a)	Answers are likely to give such descriptions as:- Enemy numbered 3000 - Muslims 700/ initially the Muslims were victorious/ but a group, greedy for booty, disobeyed the Prophet's instructions/ this action led to disaster (loss of the battle)/many Muslims were killed /and the Prophet was wounded. 7(b)	<u>Answers are likely to refer to such points as:-</u> <u>Character:</u> He fought bravely /with his men even after he was wounded/ he showed concern for his followers in that he ensured that the enemy would not return, lighting fires to scare them off. <u>Faith:</u> When morale was low, certain ayats were revealed to the Prophet /to persuade him not to lose heart and to convey this message to his followers. / Among these were the words: "Did you think that you would enter the Garden without Allah testing you?" 7(c)	Answers are likely to make such comments as:- It is imperative that Muslims should take notice of the Prophet's words and example; as he did, they should show their obedience to Allah at all times. They should not give way to the temptations of the material world but remain true to their faith. They should realise that life is a test for the life to come; Allah tests the use of circumstances and talents; a Muslim's duty is to accept, remain faithful and seek to do God's will. (Other approaches are possible and should be rewarded accordingly)	(6) 18

8(a)	Answers are likely to refer to such points as:- The Prophet embarked on a pilgrimage to Makkah but for the sake of peace agreed the Treaty at Hudaybiyyah and returned to Madinah. /After two years the Quraysh broke the treaty and the Prophet advanced on Makkah with 10000 men./ He declared a general amnesty, entered the city, purified the Ka'bah and treated the Makkans with clemency: "Go away; you are free." (3x2 developed points)	(6)

8(b)	Answers are likely to refer to such lessons as:- Hudaybiyyah showed the Prophet's peaceful nature;/ he preferred negotiation to war. His merciful nature /is shown in his bloodless capture of Makkah and the general pardon of his enemies. His first thought was for the Ka'bah and its purification,/ showing how he put Allah first in his life. (3x 2 marks) (Other approaches are possible and should be

8(c)	Answers are likely to refer to such comments as:- By his statement he meant that right had triumphed over wrong, that the true faith of Islam was established and that the era of the worship of idols was over.(2 marks) Truthfulness is important to Islam not only because it promotes unity among its followers but also because it sets the religion itself on a high moral plane, giving it a world-wide reputation for honesty and justice. Man will be rewarded or punished according to his behaviour on earth (3.30, 18.50) 2. Allah will requite wrong and will be "swift in reckoning" (14.47,51) 3. Not only does it give guidance on how to live one's life but also it provides comfort, sustenance and the opportunity to obtain mercy through repentance. In a mercurial, changeable and complex world, God is the One constant who provides a solid foundation and gives hope for the future. As the "father" of religion he links Jews and Christians to Muslims everywhere, providing a base of unity.

14(c)	Answers are likely to refer to such reasons as:- Almost certainly, this statement will be disputed, on the grounds that the strengthening of family ties helps to bring unity to the community and ultimately the nation of Islam; that respect for each member of the family sets an example to the non- Muslim world; and that to respect family life is to follow the example of the Prophet - and indeed the injunctions of the Qur'an. Some candidates may follow the line that family values have declined in modern times (lamentably - they may add): if so, give credit. He should perform the duties of the Prophet. <u>Comment:</u> He must guide the people, showing them the way of prosperity in this world and the next. 3. He ought also to hold the highest position as a public authority. <u>Comment:</u> Thus he may increase justice and eliminate enmity and oppression. (3x2 marks) 	(6)

15(b)	Answers are likely to make such comments as:- (i) He is incapable of making errors or doing wrong because the Imams are the preservers of Islam and it is under their protection. (iii) The Imam is divinely-inspired; thus he is able to understand information about anything, anywhere, and at any time. (3 x 2 marks)	(6)

18(b)	 <u>Answers are likely to refer to such examples as:-</u> 1. He gave his ring to a beggar while performing rak'ah. / This generous act shows the Imams how they must guard and protect the weakest in the community. 2. He would not do wrong even to an ant by stealing a grain of barley from it. / This teaches the Imams that one of the worst sins is enmity and iniquity between persons. 3. At the time of the Hijrah he bravely acted as a decoy by sleeping on the Prophet's bed, wrapped in his cloak. / This shows the Imams to be prepared to give their lives for the sake of the faith. 18(c)	Answers are likely to refer to such arguments as:- The fact that the Mahdi has lived for such a long time is a miracle granted to him by Allah, no more amazing than the miracle at the start of his Imamate. Even though medical science cannot prolong human life as much as possible, Allah can, e.g., Nuh and Isa. The Mahdi has been promised at a time when the height of injustice and tyranny has been reached. This idea of salvation is not new but not outdated, either, for all Muslim sects and peoples of other religions hold this expectation to be true. 19(a)	Answers are likely to give such explanations as:- (i) This is the bridge over Hell, over which all people must pass. /It is uncertain whether the term refers to a thin material object or a spiritual straightness, but it is believed it will take material form on the Day of Judgement. (ii) Again either spiritual or physical, the concept is of two pans in which earthly deeds are weighed./For those whose deeds are heavy (with good works) the reward is Paradise, while for those whose deeds are light, a terrible fate awaits them. (iii) Paradise is a place of peace and bliss, with pleasant gardens through which rivers flow,/whereas Hell is a place of eternal fire and torment, boiling water, rods of iron and bitter food.
