## Thucydides

(a) When should the other Theban army have arrived at Plataea, and why was it important that they arrive at this time?
(b) What efforts did they make to arrive at Plataea as soon as possible, and how
successful were they? Explain the reasons for the eventual time of their arrival.
(c) Do you think they were to blame for this? Give a reason for your view. $\mathbf{1}$
3. In what ways does Thucydides hold the reader's attention and make his narrative interesting? Refer to the Greek and English passages you have read to support your answer.
