- Were not aware of the danger
 - Had been an earthquake 17 years earlier and may have survived that
 - Hid in house for protection
 - Important job
 - In no position to escape eg slave, infant, sick or too old
 - Nowhere to go
 - No transport

Any other reasonable answer

- Poor people and slaves most certainly would have had hard lives
 - Rich people would have had easy lives
 - Evidence from houses of expensive décor
 - Number of rooms etc
 - Evidence of lots of expensive foods
 - Evidence of lots of shops/consumerism
 - Sickness caused early deaths of rich and poor alike

Any other acceptable answer. A good answer would look at positive and negative aspects of life in Pompeii.

 - Seated 20,000 obviously popular place
 - Stone structure
 - One of first buildings repaired after earthquake

Baths

- Number of complexes suggest popularity

 - Decoration
 - A lararium
 - Few tables and chairs
 - Idea of snack-bar or fast food shop like today
