Finalised Marking Instructions

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Part One: General Marking Principles for Drama Intermediate 2

This information is provided to help you understand the general principles you must apply when marking candidate responses to questions in this Paper. These principles must be read in conjunction with the specific Marking Instructions for each question.

- (a) Marks for each candidate response must <u>always</u> be assigned in line with these general marking principles and the specific Marking Instructions for the relevant question. If a specific candidate response does not seem to be covered by either the principles or detailed Marking Instructions, and you are uncertain how to assess it, you must seek guidance from your Team Leader/Principal Assessor.
- (b) Marking should always be positive ie, marks should be awarded for what is correct and not deducted for errors or omissions.

GENERAL MARKING ADVICE: Drama Intermediate 2

The marking schemes are written to assist in determining the "minimal acceptable answer" rather than listing every possible correct and incorrect answer. The following notes are offered to support Markers in making judgements on candidates' evidence, and apply to marking both end of unit assessments and course assessments.

Part Two: Marking Instructions	for each Question

1	The question asks candidates to outline the action of the extract. Answers should reflect the extract as a whole rather than one small part of it, but it is not relevant to refer to what happens in the rest of the play. Some degree of speculation as to the circumstances is acceptable as long as it is reasonable.	6	Mark as 2 parts. 3+3 please indicate on paper response could be a 'good' description and a 'poor' theme.
	The candidate should also identify one or more appropriate themes/issues. Here it might equally be relevant to discuss the intentions of the playwright in terms of what is being communicated to the audience: (message, meaning, mood and atmosphere, characters and relationships).		
	Candidates should be given credit for answers that show understanding of the impact and sub-text of the extract.		
	Justification by referring to the text is not specifically asked for in this question, although good answers may contain some.		
	The candidate has:		
	In a GOOD response: accurately identified what happens throughout the extract - 3 marks fully explained what is being explored and communicated in terms of theme(s) and issue(s) - 3 marks		
	In a FAIR response: identified some points of the action - 2 marks given some explanation about what is being explored and communicated in terms of theme(s) and issues(s) - 2 marks		
	In a POOR response: Given a limited description of the action - 1 mark given little explanation of what is being communicated in terms of theme(s) or issue(s) - 1 mark

2	The answer must relate to the chosen theme or issue. If a candidate fails to give an appropriate audience response, then no marks should be given. The candidate has: In a GOOD response: Suggested an appropriate audience response to the chosen theme/issue and fully explained why an audience might respond in that way. 3 marks In a FAIR response: Suggested an appropriate audience response to the chosen theme/issue and explained why an audience might respond in that way. 2 marks In a POOR response: Suggested an appropriate audience response to the theme/issue but no explanation to why an audience might respond in that way. 1 mark	3

Question 3	Expected Answer/s Answers should relate to the theme or issue chosen in Question 2, otherwise no marks will be given. The question asks for a description of practical activities, and although they may be named incorrectly or are unrecognisable to the marker, credit must be awarded for an appropriate activity that has been described. The candidate has: In a GOOD response: Fully described two different practical activities that would help to understand the theme or issue chosen in Q2. 		In a FAIR response: Offered some appropriate and		
		imaginative ideas of how they would use voice/movement. Partial justification given as to what aspects of the characters personality this would show. 2-3 marks		
		In a POOR response: Offered inappropriate ideas of how they would use voice/movement. Limited justification given as to what aspects of the characters personality this would show. 1 mark

	In a FAIR response: offered some imaginative and appropriate ideas; given some adequate explanation and justification; used some theatre terminology. 2-3 marks		
	In a POOR response: offered some ideas that may be appropriate; given little or no explanation and justification; used little or no theatre terminology. 0-1 marks
