## Foundation

1. (a) They should enjoy themselves or equivalent $\mathbf{1}$
(b) They will die, (the sun does not) or equivalent $\mathbf{1}$
(c) Any reasonable answer that shows some understanding of the poem eg because of their affair; or because they are jealous of their love or because she is married
2. (a) Go into mourning 1
(b) Lesbia/his girlfriend $\mathbf{1}$
(c) A - going to land of the dead 1
(d) Death etc has taken sparrow away/devours beautiful things/Lesbia is upset $\mathbf{1}$
(e) She is crying 1
3. (a) B-a dog 1
(b) Two of the following:

- (Catullus') sparrow
- Dove/dove's kiss
- (all) the girls
- (Indian) jewels
(c) One of the following:
- Seems to speak
- Feels sadness/happiness
- Has feelings
(d) Two of the following:
- Avoids spoiling the blankets
- Wakes her master/uses her paw
- Asks to be put down (from the bed)
- Asks to be lifted back/up
(e) Any reasonable answer that shows some understanding of the poem

4. (a) Fabullus/a friend/a party guest
(b) Anything that shows understanding of the poem, but most likely the fact that the guest has to bring the dinner
(c) One of the following:

- The gods gave it to his girl/have provided it
- It smells so lovely
- Fabullus would even want to be just one big nose

5. $\quad \mathrm{B}-\mathrm{He}$ has been invited as a guest

C - He complains he is not being treated fairly

## General

1. (a) Two of the following:

- Wags its tail
- Rubs itself against Androclus
- Licks him
(b) One of the following:
- No longer afraid
- Regains composure
- Looks closely at the lion
- Allows himself to be cuddled
- (Almost) dead with fear
(c) Happiness or similar 1
(d) One mark for the reaction, one mark for reason, eg
- Crowd would have been amazed
- Crowd would have been disappointed
- Because the lion did not eat him

2. (a) Two of the following:

- He calls Carthage a "whirlpool of sin"
- He refers to "throbbing entertainments"
- He calls the public shows "squalid"
- The shows "swallowed" Alypius up
- The shows made him "manic"
(b) Two of the following:
- God intervened
- Augustine made a comment about racing-fanatics
- Alypius took his comment to heart/changed his ways

3. (a) Two of the following:

- Hatred
- Confusion
- Torture/pain/agony
(b) (i) They should be written in:
- Wind
- Water
(ii) This shows that her words are impermanent/changeable/unreliable (or some such phrase)

4. (a) Difficult to give up his love 1
(b) The gods 1
(c) Two of the following:

- Love is now a plague
- Love is like a numbness/paralysis
- He wants to be healthy/better again
- Love is now a disease/foul illness
- Love is a pestilence
(d) Any 2 separate points or one point well developed $\mathbf{2}$

5. (a) Latona 1
(b) Juno 1
(c) Two of the following:

- It was sunny/hot
- She was tired
- Her struggle/journey had lasted a long time
- She was thirsty
- Her babies had drunk her dry/she was having to breastfeed her babies
- She has two babies with her/had recently given birth


## Credit

1. (a) and (b) 2 decisions needed, with risk involved each time. Possible answers:

- To run away from master/dangerous course of action, as severe punishment if caught
- To go into the desert/dangerous as difficult to live there eg thirst, hunger, wild animals
- To go into cave/dangerous as could be home of a wild animal
- To take thorn out of the lion/dangerous as lion may have reacted fiercely
- To leave cave/dangerous as he could be caught; or difficult to break the bond with the lion

2. References might include:

- It is like murder/lots of bloodshed
- Fighters have no protection
- Crowd only want killing
- Crowd behaving like wild beasts
- No way out for the fighters but death
- The fact that these are condemned criminals/made to fight as their death sentence
- Several examples of the crowd's bloodlust could be given from the words they shout in lines 24-29 (but max of three)

3. (a) Some possible answers with reference to the text may be:

- Examples of lines 1 and 2; it is a clever arrangement with similar vocabulary.
- Key change of tense to show Martial's new relationship
- Line 3; neat balance between the two halves of the line to show the contrast between the two girls
- "tempora quid faciunt"; some explanation of why effective eg emphasis on times/tenses; or how this exclamation reflects well Martial's attitude
- "hanc volo, te volui"; it is a clever arrangement with similar vocabulary
- Use of short, sharp sentences for needed effects (English translation is also acceptable)
(b) Some possible answers for one mark may be:
- Fickle
- Cruel
- Thoughtless
- Unkind
- Cannot sustain long-term relationships

Second mark given for a reason that is based on the poem
4. (a) Candidates should give three references to the text to show this. Possible answers could be:

- Reference to gods and goddesses of love (line 1)
- Reference to people who are sensitive to love ("venustiorum") (line 2)
- Use of "my girl" (lines 3,4 )
- Catullus is thinking of the effect (tears) on his girlfriend at the end
- It is possible to accept examples of his girlfriend's love for the sparrow too eg she loved it more than her own eyes, or its love for her
- It was her "darling"
(b) Candidates should give two references to the text to show this. Possible answers could be (any two):
- Poem is like a poem of mourning for a human
- The sparrow knew its mistress as well as a girl knows her mother
- It is represented as going down to the underworld, like a human
- It communicates (with Lesbia)

5. (a) (i) "vixque...via vocis"/the v sound highlights how her voice was struggling (or other reasonable answer)
(ii) - Nectar - the drink of the gods

- She was so thirsty a drink of water would taste as special as nectar
- As a goddess, she was used to drinking nectar
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(b) Candidates should back up their answer with three references to lines 63-69 to show whether the frogs seem happy or not. Possible references:

- Being under water/submerging their bodies
- Putting their heads above the water
- Swimming (on the surface)
- Being on bank of the pool
- Jumping back in
- Exercised their foul tongues (or paraphrase of this)
- No sense of shame
- Saying nasty things
