





- The daily average of Scotland's prison population was 7,853 in 2011; Scotland's prisons are designed to hold 7,330 prisoners.

- The cost of keeping someone in prison for 16 weeks is £9,760, compared to £2,718, which is the cost of the alternative of electronic tagging.
- Most criminals in Scotland's prisons have previous convictions.
- Many people commit crimes while on Community Service Orders.
- Victims of crime need to see that criminals have been punished.




























(d) Study Sources 1 and 2 below, then answer the question which follows.

SOURCE 1

Crime in Brazil

Brazil is one of the most dangerous countries of the world. Crimes such as murder, muggings, robberies, kidnappings and gang violence are a problem, especially in the cities. However a continuing trend is the reduction of crime rates in recent years. Sao Paulo's murder rate is now around 10 murders per 100,000, down from 40 per 100,000 in 1999.

Number of murders in Rio de Janerio – 2005–2010



Since 2005 the murder rate in Rio de Janerio has fallen every year. The murder rate in Sao Paulo has also decreased.

SOURCE 1

The 2006 Presidential Election

Luiz Inacio "Lula" da Silva was elected President after winning the election in 2006.

Former Governor of Sao Paulo State, Jose Serra came second in the Presidential elections.

Voting is compulsory in Brazil and voter turnout is usually high compared with other countries. In 2006 voter turnout was 83.5%.

President Lula promised to help the poorest people in the country by building more houses and schools as well as creating new jobs.

SOURCE 2

The 2010 Presidential Election

Voting is compulsory in Brazil but in the 2010 election voter turnout was down from the previous election to 78.5%.

After a close race Dilma Rouseff became the first female Brazilian President in 2010.

The new President said that her government will focus on job creation, house building and new schools to reduce the number of people living in poverty.

Jose Serra stood against Dilma Rousseff in the election but once again he lost the election.

Sources 1 and 2 give information about the 2006 and 2010 Presidential Elections.

Study the two sources and write down what these **differences** are.

Mention **two** differences in your answer.
