



#### VIEW OF ALEX BROWN

The number of unemployed people in the United Kingdom has fallen in recent years.

Jobseeker's Allowance (JSA) was introduced by the Government to replace Unemployment Benefit. It is a weekly payment which is just enough to meet an unemployed person's basic needs.

To receive this benefit, an unemployed person must be aged 18 years or over, and actively seeking work.

JSA aims to get unemployed people into a job that best suits their qualifications.

#### SOURCE 2

#### VIEW OF NICOLA McLEAN

Jobseeker's Allowance (JSA) tries to push people off benefits and into any low paid job that's available.

Any unemployed person who is looking for a job, and is 18 or over, can apply.

The money is paid every week, but it is not enough for unemployed people to live on.

The Government brought in JSA as a replacement for Unemployment Benefit.

In the last few years there has been a decrease in the level of unemployment in the United Kingdom.



# The Rockford Record

#### Home Ownership Today

Home ownership is seen as an important part of the American Dream in the USA.

In 2006, home ownership was 75% for White families but only 47% for Black, 50% for Hispanic and 60% for Asian families. Compared to 1998, this is an increase of 3% for White families, 2% for Black families, 5% for Hispanic families and for Asian families the increase is 8%.

Today, there are still big differences in the rates of home ownership between whites and other ethnic minority groups.

In 2006, unemployment was at its lowest for all ethnic minority groups. The group with the lowest unemployment in 2006 has seen the greatest increase in home ownership.

#### Report about the Wealth Gap

Unemployment in China is increasing the gap between rich and poor.

Unemployed people in Henan province struggle to live on \$12 per month in benefits whereas the average monthly wage is \$64. The average monthly wage in Beijing is \$138 and in Guangdong it is \$149.

Different education levels affect the differences in income.

The highest ownership of cars was in Beijing where 20% of households owned a car whereas in Guangdong it was 8% and in Henan 3%.

Since 1998, unemployment has increased in all the selected regions. The region with the lowest rate of unemployment in 2006 had the highest average monthly income.





#### Information about Tonu

Tonu is a town in the African country of Ghana. Tonu's population is around 23,000. Many of the people are very poor and half of them live on less than one dollar per day. The average income in the town is only \$500 per year.

Ghana is a democratic country, with elections being held every four years. It is difficult to improve standards of living as only 58% of Tonu's population can read and write.

Ghana's government wants to solve some of Tonu's problems. They are not sure if **Project A** or **Project B** would **best solve these problems**.

# PROJECT A

#### BS Industries - New factories



A new factory will be built in Tonu on land which will have to be cleared of rubbish. Electrical goods will be produced and sold throughout the world. Wages are likely to be around \$1000 each per year for the 110 permanent workers.

The jobs will be low skilled and require little education. Some temporary jobs will be created to clear the land. The building work itself will take around four months to complete.

#### PROJECT B

# **Ghana Learning Foundation – Schools**



This charity works in many different parts of Ghana. Five new primary schools will be built in Tonu, giving around two thousand children access to education for the first time.

Each school will serve a main housing area. Schools will be built on land that is not being currently used. The building work will take around 6 months to complete. 100 local people will be trained as teachers. They will then earn around \$1200 per year.

Using **only** the information above, decide which project, **Project A** or **Project B**, would be the **better** choice for Ghana's government to **solve Tonu's problems**.

Give **two** reasons to **support** your decision.
