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## 2012 Russian Higher: Reading and Directed Writing

## Marking Key

The comprehension questions are designed to find out whether the candidates have understood the main points of the passages, including where appropriate something of the author's purpose in writing the text.

In the marking schemes which follow, an asterisk designates information required for the award of 1 mark; a word or concept printed in bold type must be evident within an answer before the mark can be awarded.

To assess an answer, tick each piece of information which constitutes a correct point. If the information is subsequently contradicted in the same answer, put a cross through the relevant tick. Similarly, if correct information is accompanied in the same answer by information which shows lack of real understanding, put a cross through the relevant tick.

No marks can be awarded in a sentence whose overall meaning is unclear.
The inclusion of irrelevant information in an answer should not be penalised unless it contradicts the text.
If information required but not given in answer to one question appears in answer to a different question, it cannot be credited with any marks unless it would also correctly answer that question.

The total mark awarded for each question should be written on the inside margin, at the end of the relevant question.
When the comprehension questions have been marked, marks should be totalled and written on the inside margin as a mark out of 20.

## Section I - General Points

Correct marks should be marked with a tick and the total number of marks written in the inside margin after each heading.
No marks should be given for points written under a different heading unless they would also answer that heading. In such a case the mark should be transferred to the total for the heading under which the mark was originally allocated. Where candidates list irrelevant information, no credit should be given for this, even if there is some correct information in the middle of it.

The total number of marks scored should be written in the inner margin at the end of Section I.

## Translation into English

The translation into English is allocated 10 marks. The text for translation will be divided into a number of sense units. Each sense unit is worth 2 marks, which will be awarded according to the quality and accuracy of the translation into English. In assessing the candidate's performance, the descriptions detailed below will be used. Each sense unit will be awarded one of the marks shown.

| Unsatisfactory | 0 | The candidate fails to demonstrate sufficient understanding of the essential information and relevant details. Errors <br> may include mistranslation and/or failure to translate relevant details. |

## Higher Writing

Task: Directed Writing, addressing 6 bullet points.
Assessment 1 With reference to Content, Accuracy and Language Resource, Process: assess the overall quality of the response and allocate it to a pegged mark.

2 Check that all 6 bullet points have been addressed.
3 Deduct 2 marks (ie single marks, not pegged ones) for each bullet not addressed, up to a maximum of 2 bullets. If 3 or more bullets have not been addressed, the mark must be 0 .

| Unsatisfactory | 6 | - In some cases the content may be basic. <br> - In other cases there may be little difference in content between Satisfactory and Unsatisfactory. <br> - The language is repetitive, with undue reliance on fixed phrases and a limited range of common basic verbs such as to be, to have, to play, to watch. <br> - While the language used to address the more predictable bullet points may be accurate, serious errors occur when the candidate attempts to address the less predictable areas. <br> - The Directed Writing may be presented as a single paragraph. | - Ability to form tenses is inconsistent. <br> - In the use of the perfect tense the auxiliary verb is omitted on a number of occasions. <br> - There may be confusion between the singular and plural form of verbs. <br> - There are errors in many other parts of speech - gender of nouns, cases, singular/plural confusion - and in spelling and, where appropriate, word order. <br> - Several errors are serious, perhaps showing mother tongue interference. <br> - There may be one sentence which is not intelligible to a sympathetic native speaker. <br> - One area may be very weak. <br> - Overall, there is more incorrect than correct. | - The candidate copes mainly only with the predictable language required at the earlier bullet points. <br> - The verbs "was" and "went" may also be used correctly. <br> - There is inconsistency in the use of various expressions, especially verbs. <br> - Sentences are more basic. <br> - An English word may appear in the writing or a word may be omitted. <br> - There may be an example of serious dictionary misuse. |

| Poor | 3 | - The content and language may be very basic. <br> - However, in many cases the content may be little different from that expected at Unsatisfactory or even at Satisfactory. | - Many of the verbs are incorrect or even omitted. <br> - There are many errors in other parts of speech - personal pronouns, gender of nouns, adjective endings, cases, singular/plural confusion and in spelling and word order. <br> - Prepositions are not used correctly. <br> - The language is probably inaccurate throughout the writing. <br> - Some sentences may not be understood by a sympathetic native speaker. | - The candidate cannot cope with more than one or two basic verbs, frequently "had" and "was". <br> - The candidate displays almost no knowledge of past tenses of verbs. <br> - Verbs used more than once may be written differently on each occasion. <br> - The candidate has a very limited vocabulary. <br> - Several English or "made-up" words may appear in the writing. <br> - There are examples of serious dictionary misuse. |

| the candidate only addresses one part of one of the introductory, <br> predictable bullet points? | In such a case the candidate is deemed to have not addressed the bullet points <br> and a 2 mark penalty is made (ie 2 marks are deducted from the final mark <br> awarded). This procedure applies at all categories. |
| some bullet points fit into one category but others are in the next, <br> lower category? | It is important to look carefully at which bullet points are better addressed. <br> If the better sections include the more predictable bullet points, the marker is <br> less likely to be generous than if the unpredictable bullet points are of a better <br> quality. If there is a serious decline after the initial bullet points, a lower mark <br> must be awarded. |
| It is also important to consider the balance of the bullet points. Sometimes a <br> candidate writes twice as much about the opening bullet points - or even bullet <br> points which are not there - than for the four remaining bullet points. In such <br> cases, the lower mark being considered should be awarded. |  |
| is good enough to pass or not quite good enough to pass? | It is essential to consider carefully the accuracy of the verbs overall. If more <br> verbs are correct than wrong, then it is likely that the candidate deserves to <br> pass, unless there are many other inaccuracies in the writing. |
| the Directed Writing, from the point of view of content, looks as if it <br> belongs in a top category, but where accuracy is concerned, <br> contains some possibly serious grammatical errors in more basic <br> structures as a result of using relatively advanced structures <br> combined with a less than confident knowledge of the more basic <br> structures? | This is a case where the candidate is more adventurous, but less accurate. It <br> is always important to assess what it is the candidate can do, and thus highlight <br> the positive. However, in such cases, it is likely that the candidate will be <br> awarded 9. |
