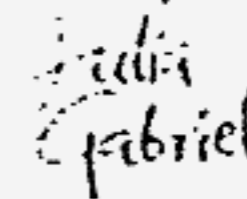

Roald Dahl, the famous children's book writer, was born to Harald and Sofie Magdalene Dahl on 13 September 1916. He was named after the explorer, Roald Amundsen, their national hero in Norway at that time.

In 1920, when Dahl was four, his father died at the age of fifty-seven. Rather than moving back to Norway to live with her relatives, his mother 5 decided to remain in Britain. It had been her husband's wish to have their children educated in the best school in the world.

At the age of eight, Dahl and four of his friends were caned by the headmaster after putting a dead mouse in a jar of sweets at the local candy store owned by an old woman they found mean and loathsome. 10 Throughout his childhood, Dahl was sent to several boarding schools. Driven by homesickness, he wrote to his mother almost every day. Only when she died did he find out **she had saved every single one of his letters.**

Young Dahl used to dream of inventing a chocolate bar that would win the praise of the owner of the chocolate company, Cadbury. This later 15 became the inspiration for him to write his third book *Charlie and the Chocolate Factory*.
