The emus, which are flightless birds, are native birds of Australia. They were once much hated as pests as they damaged crops. Hence, they were killed in large numbers.

The emu is about two metres from its crown to its toe. It weighs about 30 kilograms. The females are usually heavier than the males. The adult female's plumage is black and covers the head, neck and general body. The small, bare, blue patches on either sides of the head and neck are less prominent in the female. The male's plumage is usually not dark, compared to that of the female. The male also has a prominently visible pale blue, bare skin on its back.

The much-reduced wings are easily concealed among the long, hairy and shaggy body feathers. The long, strong legs and feet are greyish brown in colour. The three-forward-pointing toes allow the emu to travel comfortably in all kinds of soil conditions, from hard rock surfaces to swarroy lakes and sandy deserts.

The natural diet of the emu includes bemes, fruits of all kinds, grasses and other vegetable matter, seeds and even insects.

The emu's breeding season is between the cold months of May and June. When in captivity, they do not have a fixed breeding season. In the wild, they nest on a trampled mass of weeds built behind a concealing bush. The female emu lays about seven to twelve eggs at one time. The green eggs are incubated for 58 to 61 days. The male emus will sit on the eggs while the females protect the nestling territory. Both parents share the responsibility of rearing the young.
