

"I can't wait! I can't wait," cried ten-year-old Alula Greenberg-White, hugging herself in expectation. It was 9 a.m. outside a large bookshop in North London and Alula was at the head of a queue of 100 excited children and parents. They peered through the windows at stacks of a 640-page novel, eyes searching for Joanne Kathleen Rowling, the renowned author whose books are sold in bookshops round the globe.

"I'm really not a morning person," admitted Rowling as she flexed her fingers in preparation for another marathon signing of Harry Potter and the Goblet of Fire. Rowling has enchanted children so much with her imagination and such a vivid-cast that the first four stories in the series have remained at the top of the best-seller lists. They have sold an astonishing 41 million copies.

In this digital age when it is said that children do not care for the printed word, Rowling has turned more children on to reading than any living author. With a film of the first book in production and a range of Harry Potter products sold in shops, Rowling is one of the most well-known people on the planet. Rowling is believed to be the first author ever to occupy the top three slots on The New York Times best-seller list.

"Magic has a universal appeal. I don't believe in it in the way that I describe in my books, but I'd love it to be real," she said. "The starting point for the whole of Harry Porter's world is 'What if it were real?' And I work from there." She has never had an audience in mind. "I started writing these books for me, but I really like my readers. They are very likeable people." She glanced at the queue outside, which was about 300 strong.

"Children are a writer's dream. They are not interested in sales figures. They want to know why the set of connected events works in a certain way. They know the books back to front and talk about the characters as though they are living, mutual friends of ours."

Read the passage below and answer questions 71 to 80.

The echidna, known as the spiny anteater, resembles the hedgehog and the porcupine. This is due to the sharp spines that cover it. The echidna is actually a very special mammal. It is one of the two, the other being the platypus, in the monotreme family which are mammals that lay eggs and produce milk for their young.

The echidna lives in Australia and New Guinea. It is a highly adaptable creature, surviving a range of temperatures and habitats. It uses its snout to "sniff" out ant and termite nests, after which it tears into these nests with its sharp claws and their snouts. Once the insects are exposed, the echidnas' long, fast and sticky tongues aid them in devouring these insects.

When threatened, the echidna either runs away, curls up into a ball of radiating spines or digs below the surface of the soil while remaining horizontal to disappear like a sinking ship. Cars usually kill hundreds of echidnas every year. Dingoes, foxes and snakes also pose a threat to the echidnas. Unfortunately, bushfires and droughts are natural enemies too.

During the mating season, both sexes give off a pungent odour and this helps the male echidna to find the female echidna. Trains of up to ten males may follow a mature female and the males compete for the female by engaging in head-to-head pushing and bumping contests.

After mating, the female echidna digs a burrow and develops a temporary pouch in which one soft leathery-shelled egg is laid. The egg hatches ten days after being laid and the young echidna, known as a puggle, suckles for the next eight to twelve weeks. Once the puggle develops spines and is too prickly to be carried in the pouch, the mother leaves it in the burrow but continues to care for it. This will continue for about six months before the puggle emerges from the burrow to forage for food and to learn how to survive in its habitat.
