Although the commonly held view among Singaporeans is that the grass is always greener somewhere else, for the vivacious 15-year-old, who spent seven months in New Zealand on an exchange programme last year, there is no place like home.

"After being overseas, I appreciated Singapore more. In another country, you never feel like you are equal."

She thinks more Singaporeans should spend time overseas as it will help them see Singapore differently. Her rootedness is due, in no small part, to the strong bonds she enjoys with her family. Her father is an air force technician and her mother is a housewife. Her 26-year-old sister is a kindergarten teacher. She sees no conflict between her studies and family as she always ensures that she divides her time equally between her school work and her family.

She is particularly interested in issues concerning youths and children — a passion nurtured through a programme designed by her teachers to develop the leadership qualities of the pupils in her school.
