



Why is the Olympic Games so important? Why did people from all around the world go to Greece in 2004 to either watch or compete in it? Why is it that billions of people around the world sit in front of their television sets to watch the games? To answer these questions we need to go back in history to find the meaning of the Olympic Games.

The ancient Greeks first had the idea of getting men together every four years to hold and witness sporting events (in those days women did not participate, though they had their own independent events). The idea was to have the best athletes from all over Greece gathered in one field and compete every four years. All wars and fighting had to stop while the athletes and their supporters came together in the town of Olympia for five days to compete in a few events, mostly related to warfare (throwing the javelin, running, wrestling, boxing and chariot racing).

In the ancient Games, only the winner was celebrated. Each winner was given a simple crown of olive leaves to wear on his head. The olive crown was the greatest honor for the victor and also for his family and his city. The victors were linked to the immortals, celebrated by poets and sculptors, and they often lived for the rest of their lives at public expense. Those who came in second or third got nothing. Now, of course we have gold for first place, silver for second and bronze for third.

The first written reference to the Olympic Games is 776 BC. It lasted until 389 AD. The idea of having the modern Olympic Games was suggested in the mid 19th century but it was not a world event until 1896. Besides being postponed because of wars, the modern Olympic Games has been held since then every four years in different cities around the world.

The site of the Olympic Games is chosen, usually six years in advance, by the International Olympic Committee. The Olympic Games lasts two weeks and athletes of all nations are eligible to participate.

The modern Olympic Games has many important symbols that most people recognise. Adorning the Olympic flag are five rings (coloured yellow, green, blue, black and red) that symbolises the five continents of Africa, the Americas. Australia, Asia and Europe. It is hoisted in the host city and then flown to the next one where it is kept until the next Games. The Olympic torch, which is representative of purity, the drive for perfection and the struggle for victory, is a major part of the ancient Games. It is carried with great fanfare and publicity to the host city where it lights the burning flame of the Games and is kept burning until the close of the Games.

Throughout the Games, the athletes are supposed to play with a spirit of sportsmanship. Sadly, some athletes and coaches have taken to cheating or doping, in an attempt to gain an unfair advantage. As such, drugs such as steroids that encourage muscle strength and stamina are banned. Despite these problems, the Olympic Games carries on and remains popular because through it we see that underneath all the differences, we are one race, the human race. The Olympic Games shows us what we as humans are capable of and that humanity is capable of engaging in friendly competition. And this is what the Olympic Games is all about.
