

Like all species of Pacific salmon, the Chinook salmon are hatched in fresh water, spend part of their life in the ocean, and then spawn in fresh water. All Chinook salmon die after spawning. The Chinook salmon may become sexually mature from their second through seventh year. As a result, the fish in any spawning run may vary greatly in size. A mature 3-year-old will probably weigh less than 2 kilograms, while a mature 7-year-old may exceed 25 kilograms. Females tend to be older than males at maturity. In many spawning runs, males outnumber females in all but the 6- and 7-year age groups. Small Chinook salmon that mature after spending only one winter in the ocean are commonly referred to as "jacks" and are usually males. Alaska streams normally receive a single run of Chinook salmon in the period from May through July.

The Chinook salmon often make extensive freshwater spawning migrations to reach their home streams on some of the larger river systems. Yukon River spawners bound for the extreme headwaters in Yukon Territory, Canada, will travel more than 3,200 kilometres during a 60-day period. The Chinook salmon do not feed during the freshwater spawning migration, so their condition deteriorates gradually during the spawning run as they use stored body materials for energy and for the development of reproductive products.

Each female deposits from 3,000 to 14,000 eggs in several gravel nests, or reeds, which she excavates in relatively deep, moving water. In Alaska, the eggs usually hatch in late winter or early spring, depending on the time of spawning and water temperatures. The newly hatched fish, called alevins, live in the gravel for several weeks until they gradually absorb the food in the attached yolk sac. These juveniles wiggle up through the gravel by early spring. In Alaska, most juvenile Chinook salmon remain in fresh water until the following spring when they migrate to the ocean in their second year of life.
