



Read the passage below and answer questions 71 to 80.

He may seem like an offbeat joker on television, but Steve Irwin, the son of conservationist parents, is deadly serious about keeping wildlife safe. Irwin has been helping his reptile-expert dad rescue and relocate rogue crocodiles in the rivers of North Queensland, Australia, since he was a young boy. His penchant for body slamming large crocodiles eventually gained wider recognition when his good friend, John Stainton, created the Crocodile Hunter in 1992 featuring Irwin's madcap antics with the sappy giants. The show gained a following and its host has since gone on to become a household name across 120 countries around the globe.

Despite all that he has done for wildlife, Irwin is intent on churning out more riveting programmes to educate the public. A new documentary series called Crocs In The City will shed light on his crocodile-management strategies as he struggles to balance the needs of animals and humans as their habitats merge.

Steve Irwin is also working on another project, a reality programme, Croc Challenge. Ten contestants will get a taste of working with Irwin at his zoo, which is inhabited by snakes, crocodiles, native koalas and wombats. However, Irwin will get to fire one contestant at the end of each week. "The rules are simple," he jests. "If you are hospitalised, you're fired!" The last man or woman left standing will go on an incredible journey around Australia.

The real Irwin, however, can be rather emotional. This is especially so when he talks about his bull terrier, Sui, which was diagnosed with terminal cancer. However, Irwin still takes her out to the bush even though she grows tired easily. He has to be more careful since she is so deaf in one ear that she cannot hear approaching predators like big crocodiles or snakes.

Besides animals, Irwin's life revolves around two women: his American wife Terri and their five-year-old daughter, Bindi Sue. The latter is a chip off the old block and loves getting in on the action with Irwin.

He may have an unorthodox approach to fatherhood but that has not stopped Irwin from increasing his brood. The family celebrated the birth of a new member last December. However, Irwin did not waste any time and introduced the new member to his first snake. He says proudly, "Robert was two days old when I introduced him to his first snake — but don't tell the hospital."
