

Read the passage below and answer questions 31 to 35

Dinosaurs or "terrible lizards" ruled a very different Earth for 150 million years. There were deep swamps, forests of huge trees and lush vegetation. Many lands, now separated by water, were joined together. The temperatures were also much warmer. The dinosaurs thrived in this paradise.

Everything scientists know about dinosaurs comes from fossils which have been found all over the world. Scientists have been able to reconstruct the shapes and sizes of the different species of dinosaurs from the petrified remains of bones, claws, teeth, footprints and even eggs. By analyzing <u>them</u>, scientists are also able to tell the time of each dinosaur's existence.

The earliest dinosaurs were small and walked on their hind legs. In time, some of them grew so heavy that their legs could not support all their weight on land. They developed into huge, four – legged creatures with horns and armour plates. They spent most of their time eating plants in swamps and rivers. The water helped to keep them afloat. Other dinosaurs stayed on land and ate all kinds of plants and leaves from treetops. These herbivores were hunted by ferocious meat – eating dinosaurs.

The exact cause for the extinction of dinosaurs is unknown. Many believe that the change in the Earth's climate could have been one of the main reasons. Dinosaurs were reptiles and needed warmth to give them energy to hunt for food. They did not have fur or feathers to protect them from the cold.

The changing climate also produced changes in plant life. As many dinosaurs were plant – eaters, their normal food supply might have gradually disappeared. As plant – eaters dwindled, so did meat – eaters. Soon, mammals were increasing in vast numbers. Many of them might have eaten the eggs of dinosaurs. Dinosaurs might not have been able to compete with mammals for food. Mammals were generally smaller and needed less food to survive.

Other important changes include the drifting of continents, appearance of mountains, freezing over and drying up of swamps. Some dinosaurs were unable to live on dry land. Lava from volcanoes might have killed the too.
