But the man watched without moving – even when the sound of breathing stopped. In the morning, the nurse found the other man dead, and quietly took his body away.

This Friday, when Secondary 4 student Colleen Lim dons her uniform to report for the first day of school, she will not be wearing the grey blouse and skirt of Delta Secondary, the school she attended for the past three years. Instead, she will put on the white blouse and blue skirt of Bukit Merah Secondary, which has merged with her school.

Mergers happen for various reasons, including falling enrolment because the school is located in an older estate with fewer young people. Schools are also merged when there is a need to optimise resources and provide more students with access to the latest facilities, said the Education Ministry. While some teachers will be staying on at the merged schools with their students, others have chosen to be posted to schools closer to their homes or have opted for early retirement.

Colleen, 15, who was Delta Secondary's head prefect, is looking forward to using facilities that will be available, such as a gym and bigger classrooms among other things, she admitted, "It will be sad leaving Delta. I feel a strong bond with it."

Madam Aini Ma'arof, principal of First Toa Payoh Secondary which is merging with Upper Serangoon Secondary, said, "No doubt students will have sentimental feelings towards their old schoels, but we've also done a lot of groundwork in preparation for the merger."

The 180 or so Secondary 4 and 5 students from Upper Serangoon Secondary who are moving to First Toa Payoh Secondary, together with about 15 teachers, have been sitting for the same tests and examinations as their new schoolmates for the past year. Both schools' choir and band groups have also been rehearsing together. And on the last day of school this year, Upper Serangoon Secondary students made a trip to their "new" school in Toa Payoh East in their new white and blue school uniforms.

The two schools are not the only ones working to make mergers a success.

Next year's 250 Secondary 4 and 5 students from Woodsville Secondary, which will be merging with MacPherson Secondary, attended a one-day orientation camp at MacPherson Secondary, where they toured the place, met their new student councillors and tried on their new light-blue tops and bottoms.

Said Woodsville Secondary student Claris Tan, 15, "Coming from a school with a small population, I thought I'd find it hard to adapt to one with many students, but MacPherson appears to have a great culture and I felt very comfortable there."
