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

Read the passage below and answer questions 26 to 30.

Asthma - a condition involving breathlessness and wheezing, affects more children than adults in Singapore. Asthma is a result of involuntary constriction of the airways, usually in response to airborne allergens or environmental changes. Asthma poses a great problem - affecting school or work performance, and repeated hospitalisations and visits to doctors increase socio-economic costs. In some rare cases as a result of food or insect venom anaphylaxis, the asthmatic can die or suffer severe allergic reactions.

Although the cause is largely genetic, environmental factors contribute to asthma. Triggers may be something as seemingly harmless as eggs, and the asthmatics are often irritated by air-borne particles such as air pollutants, dust mite allergens and aerosois. The commonest culprit is the house dust mite. In addition, bird's nest, a prized delicacy, has been shown to be a major cause of food-related allergy in Singapore. Even intensive exercise or a drastic drop in temperature can trigger asthma!

common misconceptions about asthma, or even through misdiagnosis from unreliable "allergy-testing", many asthmatic children may suffer from poor growth and development and an impaired quality of life for both themselves and their families. With scary stories of people dying from a sudden asthma attack triggered by peanuts, food-allergy-caused asthma figures have been inflated. Actually, according to the Children's Medical Institute at the National University Hospital (NUH), food allergens only trigger 6 to 8 per cent of childhoodasthma and 1 per cent of adult asthma.

Due to the misconceptions, some parents restrict food such as cold drinks and chocolate to prevent asthma or allergy. This is a misconception as both irritate the airways and cause coughing, which may be mistaken as early signs of asthma.

What then should be done to prevent asthma? Early identification and treatment of asthma can prevent aggravating symptoms, and allow asthmatics to enjoy life as much as non-asthmatics.

This is the true tale of a warthog, a tough charismatic animal that is common to the (African) savannah. This particular individual lived in the Sabi Sands Game Reserve, South Africa, residing in and around the lodge, where he fed on the green grass of the camp lawns and leftovers from the kitchen. Over time, he had lost his natural fear of humans and has become something of a camp mascot.

Late one afternoon, he was strolling through his "home" turf in the lodge gardens when he was surprised by a hungry lioness. He tried to escape, but only made it as far as the river before she caught him.

However, the lioness gained only a tenuous grip, and a battle of raw power and endurance began. The fight raged up and down, with the advantage swinging first this way and then that, and each opponent trying every move they knew. The warthog battered with his tough, bony head and slashed with his tusks,) while the lioness bit and savaged with tooth and claw.

After about 45 minutes, in a final do-or-die effort, the warthog caught the lioness off-guard. He landed a devastating blow that sent the cat sprawling into the water, forcing her to retreat lest she herself became the victim.

With the adrenaline wearing off, the hog crept under the breakfast deck and collapsed. The next day, the lioness returned and waited for him to make his move. The warthog escaped to the north, running through the camp where human activity deterred the lioness from pursuing him. But as he ran, he crashed into trees and rocks, because the severe swelling around his eyes had sealed them shut. Indeed the lioness had inflicted such wounds that he would never again see the light of day.

On a warm day, a month later, a bizarre creature strolled into the camp. It was clearly the same animal, but with massive swellings where his eyes should have been. He was navigating skilfully by smell alone, using footpaths and game trails to move between his burrow in the bush and his feeding grounds around the camp.

To the camp staff, he became a symbol of strength, courage and determination. He was, however, **living on borrowed time**. Five months later, the same lioness crossed his path and battled him again. This time, he did not win. Yet the legend of "Samson the Great", as he was dubbed by the local staff, lives on in the area and in the hearts and minds of those who were privy to his story.
