

Walking along, we met two young girls, no older than 15 or 16, selling medicinal herbs near a river. They carried a large basket filled with herbs, inviting passers-by to buy their goods with vibrant voices.

"Hello!" I called to them.

"Hello!" They smiled back. "We offer every kind of medicine. Choose the one you want."

I smiled at their high spirits and asked, "Do you have anything to make me smarter?"

They seemed taken aback, but only for an instant. "I'm sorry," one of them replied in a clear, firm voice. "We have just sold that out."

Our group burst into laughter at this witty reply, and I was touched. As a Chinese saying puts it, "Even a single word uttered out of goodness can warm the heart in the cold winter."

My wife and I ended up buying some herbs as souvenirs, and I wondered how the girls and their families were doing.

I believe that sincere one-to-one conversation can soften and melt even hearts that are completely frozen. By talking with someone face-to-face, you can actually change that person's life and your own. Today, we live in the midst of a flood of information. The more we rely on one-way communication, like the radio, the more we feel the need to stress the value of the human voice: The simple but precious interaction of voices.

In a face-to-face conversation; the listener can ask questions or disagree, and this in turn may make the speaker rethink his or her own views. The process is dynamic and multi-faceted, creating mutual joy and understanding. For me, I love talking to a wide range of people from all over the world. I always learn something new and I find it inspiring to be exposed to different ways of thinking.

I asked her many times. She would smile and say "One day"

Many a time, I pestered, coaxed and even used my best smile to change her mind. She would not tell me. Once, when she was admitted to the hospital for an X-ray, she refused to take her bangle off. The nurse insisted that she should remove all items from her body, but to no avail. I thought that she must have been afraid that she might lose it. After all, jade was expensive. It was her most valuable treasure.

When I was a little girl, Grandmother would let me sit on her lap. When she put her arms around me, I would hold her hands to my heart. The bangle on her wrist never failed to arouse my curiosity. She wore the bangle all the time. I had never seen her without it. "What is this?" I would ask.

I recalled the many things Grandmother told me about jade. She told me that 'jade' was derived from the Spanish word meaning hip. People used to wear the stone near their hip as protection against kidney diseases, or as a cure for such diseases—de was also known as 'axe stone' because it was fashioned in prehistoric times into tools and weapons. She also told me how a piece of jade could change in colour and appearance when worn. She showed me her bangle and related how the streaks of white and green had increased over the years. I looked hard and it seemed as if I was peering at a living thing. Somewhere along the way, Grandmother would say, "One day, I will tell you the story of my bangle." That would conclude our conversation about the jade bangle.

I remember the times when I pestered Grandmother. "Tell me, tell me, tell me," I insisted. "Tell me the story of your bangle!"

With a smile, she would say, "One day, when you are not so rude, I will tell you."

When I was ten or so, my patience began to wear out. I asked my mother, "Why does Grandmother keep saying One day'. Why won't she tell me now?"

"Be patient, Annie. She must have her reasons."

"Mom, I am sure you know the story. Can you tell me in secret?" I pestered my mother. I thought to myself, "Finally, I would get to hear from my mother." 30 Mother walked away, pretending not to hear.

My little brother Zi Han did not share my curiosity. He simply said, "When Grandmother tells you the story, you can tell it to me."

As I turned twelve, Grandmother turned seventy-one. Perhaps she thought she did not have many more years to live. Perhaps she saw that I was growing up to 35 be a mature, sensible girl, and could now understand what she had to tell me

Grandmother did not tell me the story in one sitting. That year, the story would unfold, step by step, scene by scene, each more remarkable than the one before. My birthday fell on the week before Christmas and Grandmother promised that, by then, I would hear the ending. As it turned out, the story became her best -40 Christmas gift to me. From it, I learnt values of love, friendship, integrity and many invaluable lessons.

The story of the jade bangle is more than a story; it points to something greater. As a tale, it must be told. As a gift, it must be given.
