In early June 1994, India was hit by the worst heat wave in half a century. In New Delhi, temperatures reached 46°C in the day. Hardy camels died of heatstroke and vultures clustered around the elegant fountains of the Indian capital, desperate for a drink. At least 161 people died in the intense heat, particularly in parts of the desert regions.

The streets, which were normally choked with traffic, were strangely empty. People who should be roaming about hid themselves indoors to escape the scorching sun. Those without the refuge of proper shelter huddled in whatever shade they could find. Included among such sufferers were the street peddlers, vendors and of course, the homeless.

Wells and streams dried up and river levels fells. Villagers were forced to trek long distances to look for water. The water storage also caused the sewerage system to break down, giving rise to dangerous diseases that increased the death toll considerably.

Among the worst sufferers were the animals at the Delhi Zoo. A prized orang-utan died. The zoo keepers were kept busy trying to save some rare species from the fate of dehydration.

To counter the heat, many Indians drank lime juice laced with salt and sugar — a traditional way to fight thirst. Some resorted to drinking the juice of half-ripe mangoes or even onion juice.

Some people came up with ingenious ways to stay cool. They hung thick curtains made of fragrant grass and doused them with water — a natural air-conditioner in the days of the Mughal emperors many centuries ago.

The only people who seemed to benefit from the heat wave were the ice cream sellers and the vendors of sliced cucumber and chilled water.
