- 2 What do we lose by not having law-court speeches preserved from cities other than Athens?
- 3 Did classical Greek farmers primarily pursue subsistence strategies?
- 4 'There was no "manufacturing sector" within Greek city economies; practically every household was involved, at least from time to time, in craft production of one sort of another.' Discuss.
- 5 What was the social and economic impact of winning or losing a war in classical Greece?
- 6 What role did gift-exchange play in the classical Greek world?
- 7 What were the attractions of serving as a mercenary soldier in ancient Greece?
- 8 How often, for what reasons, and with what consequences did archaic and classical Greeks move their place of residence?
- 9 Why do so many laws concern themselves with the behaviour of women while ignoring the behaviour of men?
- 10 Where did Greeks get their slaves from?
- 11 To what extent, for what reasons, and with what consequences was there a spectrum of statuses between slave and free in archaic and classical Greece?
- 12 'Shame, not love, made the Greek world go round.' Discuss.
- 13 Why was fish better to think with than meat in the Greek world?
- 14 What role did symposia have in shaping what it was to be a citizen in the classical Greek city?
- 15 In what ways and for what purposes did Greek cities raise revenue?
- 16 'In most Greek cities being a citizen had more to do with participation in cult activities than it had with participation in political activities.' Discuss.
