8. 'The Asian financial crisis of 1997-98 changed both models of and practices in the political economy in the region.' Discuss.
9. 'Communism has been merely disguised nationalism in Indochina.' Discuss.
10. 'The Asians have values but there is no such a thing as "Asian values".' Discuss.
11. Can the European Union be a model for the development of regional integration in South East Asia?
12. How has globalization led to significant changes in Southeast Asia? Discuss with reference to examples drawn from the region.
