- 1. 'The political message of *Le Médecin de campagne* is confused; the only consistent argument is that capital should be considered as a means rather than an end.' Discuss.
- 2. 'The claim in the "Avant-propos à la Comédie humaine" to view "la Famille et non l'Individu comme le véritable élément social" is hardly lent credence by the dysfunctional family unit portrayed in *Eugénie Grandet*.' Discuss.
- 3. 'The main interest in *Histoire de la grandeur et de la décadence de César Birotteau* is derived from the tension between narrative perspective and textual detail.' Discuss.
- 4. To what extent, in your opinion, is it possible to speak of a tension between Paris and the provinces in *La Rabouilleuse*?
- 5. 'In *Illusions perdues*, for whom you write is a question inseparable from what you write and how you write.' Discuss.
- 6. 'While the plot of *La Cousine Bette* turns obsessively on marriages planned and actual, the effect is a foregrounding of the structures of compulsory heterosexuality and a critical distancing from them.' Discuss.
- 7. 'For all that Jacques Collin lives in disguise and as an outlaw until the end of *Splendeurs et misères des courtisanes*, he symbolises the very society from which he is excluded.' Discuss.
- 8. To what extent, in your opinion, is it possible to consider *L'Envers de l'histoire contemporaine* a political novel?
