SECTION A

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PLEASE USE A SEPARATE ANSWER BOOK FOR EACH QUESTION.

- 1. 'Ironically, Alloula's *Le Harem colonial* performs the colonial "strip tease" of which it offers a critique.' Discuss.
- 2. 'The exclusion of the colonised from history had serious ramifications for the colonised culture and society.' Discuss with reference to Memmi's *Portrait du colonisé*.
- 3. To what extent is Delacroix's painting *Femmes d'Alger dans leur appartement* an apt emblem for Djebar's text of the same title?
- 4. 'The cultural displacement and alienation expressed by Algerian immigrants in France is manifestly expressed as a conflict in their family life between two generations with two different world-views.' Discuss with reference to Djura's *Le Voile du silence*.
- 5. How far do you agree with the view that relations between the French and the Algerians remain tainted by the violence of colonial history? Discuss with reference to Ben Jelloun's *Hospitalité française*.
- 6. 'Violence is a feature of the Manichean economy which structures the colonial space.' Discuss with reference to Pontecorvo's *La Bataille d'Alger*.
- 7. 'Camus is a novelist from whose work the facts of imperial actuality, so clearly there to be noted, have dropped away; what remains is an ethos suggesting universality and humanism, deeply at odds with the descriptions of geographical locale plainly given in the fiction.' Discuss this evaluation with reference to 'La Femme adultère' AND/OR L'Etranger.

- 8. 'Le Noir veut être comme le Blanc. Pour le Noir, il n'y a qu'un destin. Et il est blanc' (Fanon, *Peau noire, masques blancs*). Explain the reasons for this statement, and evaluate Fanon's arguments in support of it.
- 9. Analyse the representation in Etcherelli's *Elise ou la vraie vie* of the relations between Algerian immigrants in Paris and the French working class.
- 10. 'Schwarz-Bart's *Pluie et vent sur Télumée Miracle* suggests that the Caribbean woman is better able to resist the pressures of internalised racism than her male counterpart.' Discuss.

SECTION B

PLEASE USE A SEPARATE ANSWER BOOK FOR EACH QUESTION.

In this section the word 'texts' may be taken to refer to any of the films, theoretical texts or literary works studied on this course.

- 11. 'The "question du foulard" is inextricably bound up with France's colonial history and politics in Algeria.' Discuss with reference to TWO or ALL of the following: La Bataille d'Alger; Le Voile du silence; Hospitalité française.
- 12. Discuss the intersection of history, gender and narrative in TWO or MORE of the texts studied on this course.
- 13. 'Colonialism produced a fracture at the core of French citizenship: it subjected the colonised to French laws but denied them the rights of political citizenship. This fracture also manifested itself in the form of a disjunction between the public and private spheres, between personal life and the life of the nation, between past and present.' Discuss with reference to TWO or MORE of the texts studied on this course.
- 14. Discuss the connections between racism and sexual desire in TWO or MORE of the texts you have studied on this course.
- 15. 'The oppression of women in colonised societies is qualitatively different from that of men.' Discuss with reference to TWO or MORE of the texts you have studied on this course.
- 16. Compare the treatment of the theme of social exclusion in TWO or MORE of the texts you have studied on this course.
