- 1. 'The plot of Molière's *Dom Juan* could be likened to a hunt in which, little by little, the hunter is reduced to the role of prey.' Discuss.
- 2. How might Molière's lack of respect for the unities of time and place in *Dom Juan* contribute to our understanding of the play? Illustrate your answer with precise examples.
- 3. 'In *Britannicus*, Racine is concerned to depict Néron as evil, but still humanly understandable.' Discuss.
- 4. 'The character of Britannicus stands as the antithesis to Néron and to Néron's court.' Discuss with reference to *Britannicus*.
- 5. Discuss the function and effect of Rousseau's use, in the *Discours sur l'inégalité*, of theatrical scenes and powerful and often violent imagery.
- 6. Compare and contrast Rousseau's portrayal of natural man and civilised man in the *Discours sur l'inégalité*, focusing on the natural passions of self-love and pity in the first instance, and on the social passions of amour-propre and rivalry in the second.
