always aesthetic failings?

- 8. EITHER (a) How, if at all, can music be profound?
 - OR (b) Does music have meaning?
- 9. Can an account of pictorial representation dispense with the notion of resemblance?
- 10. What role, if any, do the emotions have in aesthetic experience?
- 11. 'Photographs can only have the aesthetic properties that are possessed by what the photographs are photographs of.' Discuss.
- 12. What is narrative?
