- 1. Expound and defend what you take to be the best account of the semantics of indexical expressions.
- 2. What problems does 'Ortcutt believes that someone is a spy' pose for semantic theory? How may these problems be solved?
- 3. 'Tarski defined truth in terms of meaning; Davidson defined meaning in terms of truth.' Critically discuss this claim.
- 4. In what sense, if any, is it true to say that someone who understands a natural language tacitly knows a syntactic and semantic theory of that language?
- 5. Is the perspective of the radical interpreter the best one to adopt in giving an account of meaning?
- 6. What problems are caused for philosophical accounts of meaning by the phenomenon of metaphor? What is the best way to solve these problems?
- 7. Are definite descriptions quantificational expressions?

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- 8. 'No word or sentence of natural language has a context-independent meaning, therefore any attempt to provide a formal semantics for a natural language will fail.' Discuss
- 9. Explain and defend what you take to be the best solution to Sorites paradoxes.
- 10. What is the best account of the link between a referring expression and the item that it refers to?
