- 1. Does Mill give a satisfactory account of the meaning of names?
- 2. Did Mill have good reasons for his assertion that matter is the permanent possibility of sensation?
- 3. EITHER (a) According to Mill, '"The cause" is the sum total of the conditions positive and negative taken together'. Explain and assess this view.
  - OR (b) Explain how Mill's methods might be brought to bear on the claim that striking matches causes them to light, and on the claim that a particular striking caused a particular lighting.
- 4. Does Mill's rejection of the notion of necessity enable him to construct a satisfactory account of free will?
- 5. Discuss Mill's claim that if we call the mind a series of feelings 'we are obliged to complete the statement by calling it a series of feelings which is aware of itself as past and future.'

- 6. Explain and assess Mill's reasons for introducing the distinction between higher and lower pleasures.
- 7. Does Mill give good reasons for rejecting 'the Geometrical method' in the social sciences?
- 8. Explain and assess Mill's 'proof' of the principle of utility. Is it a proof in any proper sense?
- 9. Can Mill show that the existence of positive duties of assistance is consistent with the liberty (harm) principle?
