- 5. Could God be both omniscient and immutable?
- 6. Can divine omniscience be reconciled with human freedom?
- 7. 'The concept of divine simplicity is meaningless.' Discuss.
- 8. Is belief in God 'properly basic'? Illustrate your answer with reference to the work of Alvin Plantinga.
- 9. Is there a philosophically acceptable defence of petitionary prayer?
- 10. Outline and assess the strengths and weaknesses of the case for natural theology in the justification of theistic belief.
- 11. Must God be maximally great?
- 12. EITHER (a) Is there a plausible argument for the immortality of the soul?
 - OR (b) Could a person survive his own death?

- 13. To what extent, if at all, can the idea of a rational soul illuminate the concept of personal identity?
- 14. Must someone who belongs to a faith believe the doctrines of that faith?
