- 3. Consider the position of women in Viking-Age Scandinavia.
- 4. Assess the value to the student of the Viking Age of the ninth chapter of Constantine Porphyrogenitus's *De administrando imperio*.
- 5. What is the value of Rimbert's *Vita Anskarii* as a source for the history of ninth-century Sweden?
- 6. EITHER: (a) Describe the preservation of The Anglo-Saxon chronicle.
 - OR: (b) Give an account based on *The Anglo-Saxon chronicle* of Viking activity in England over the period 789-1042.
- 7. What relevance does *The Russian primary chronicle* have to the Normanist controversy?
- 8. EITHER: (a) Give a critical account of the fourth book of Adam of Bremen's Gesta as a source for Viking Age conditions.
 - OR: (b) Discuss Adam of Bremen's description of the temple and heathen rites at Uppsala.
- 9. What are our sources for the god Baldr and what information do they give us?
- 10. Write notes on THREE of the following: the Varangian guard; Unni, archbishop of Hamburg-Bremen; Gotlandic picture stones; Helgö (Uppland); the Battle of Clontarf; Sven Haraldsson Forkbeard; Jumne; the Danelaw; the second Rus attack on Constantinople; Norse ship-names; Staraia Ladoga; the god Ullr.
